LSA to Present Jazz Folk Mass

The 20th Century Folk Mass will be presented at 4 p.m. tomorrow in the Lutheran Student Center, Carol Kuhre, LSA counselor, said recently.

The folk mass or "jazz mass" as it is commonly called, was written by Geoffrey Beaumont, an Anglican clergyman from England, during the 1950's in the folk idiom.

Folk idiom means music that is most familiar to the people at any particular time, Mrs. Kuhre explained.

The "Jazz Mass" attempts to make the service used by the Lutheran church more meaningful to the common man by using a language and music that is familiar to him, she said.

Special participants in the mass will be the Rev. W. W. Kuhre, directing the choir composed of 25 students; Robin Smith, combo leader; Dale Livingston, cantor and the Rev. Arthur R. Seyda, minister.

State Department Official Will Speak at Service

Col. Francis P. Miller, special assistant in the Department of State for Education and Cultural Affairs, will speak on "So God Created Man In His Own Image" at the 10:55 a.m. Chapel Service tomorrow in Schwab.

Miller, a native of Kentucky, graduated from Washington and Lee University and was a Rhodes scholar at Oxford in England.

He served in both World War I and II and was awarded the Legion of Merit with Oak Leaf Cluster, French Legion of Honor with Croix de Guerre and the British OBE.

Miller, an active layman in the Presbyterian Church, served on the International Committee of the YMCA, World's Student Christian Federation, General Assembly of the Southern Presbyterian Church and the Central Committee of the World Council of Churches.

Orchestra to Give Concert Tomorrow

The University Symphony Orchestra, directed by Theodore K. Karhan, associate professor of music, will present its annual spring concert at 3:15 p.m. tomorrow in Schwab.

Featured with the orchestra will be three noted cellists, Orlando Cole, his son David and David Anderson.

Orlando Cole assisted in the founding of the Curtis String Quartet and has been a member of the group since then. The elder Cole is also head of the department at the New School of Music and professor of cello at Curtis Institute in Philadelphia.

The instrument which he plays was made by Domenico Montanana in Venice in 1739. Played by Gregor Piatigorsky for 20 years, the instrument is called "the Sleeping Beauty."

Anderson is the cellist with the Don Shirley Trio, a jazz group.

His article discusses the importance of an assumption of rationality in investment planning.

Survey Finds Possible Shelter Areas

Approximately 130 approved fallout shelter areas are located on the University campus, Pasquel H. Licastro, manager of the fallout shelter study, reported.

Licastro obtained this information from the first phase of the recently completed survey of fallout shelter conditions in central Pennsylvania.

An approved shelter is one having 500 or more square feet of area with a protection factor of 20 or better. A protection factor of 20 means a structure with 20 times more protection from radiation than outdoor or other unshielded places.

Some shelters had a protection factor as high as 1,000, officials

said. Each shelter has a capacity of 50 persons, although some could accommodate more.

THE STUDY, conducted by HRB-Singer, Inc., of State College, revealed that in the 10-county area, there are about 1,050 buildings with a factor of 20 or better. The survey showed that there are 330 buildings in Centre County with a protection factor of 20 or better for at least 50 persons.

Licastro said that the central Pennsylvania survey is part of a nation-wide study conducted by the Navy and the Army Corps of Engineers at the request of President Kennedy.




