

# ICCB Career Exhibits To Open Today in HUB

Students will have an opportunity to discuss job openings with representatives from 25 organizations today and tomorrow in the Hutzel Union Building at the Career Exposition sponsored by the Inter-College Council Board.

The exposition will continue until 5:30 p.m. today and from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. tomorrow. It is divided into three parts with display booths in the game and card rooms and in the first floor lounges of the HUB.

"Two to five representatives from each organization will be available at the different display booths to answer students' questions concerning specific phases of the company's operations," Ervin Hill, ICCB chairman of the Career Exposition, said last night.

**IN SELECTING** the organizations, the ICCB has tried to include those with possible opportunities for students enrolled in all colleges at the University, Hill said.

"The primary purpose of the Career Exposition is to acquaint underclassmen with potential job openings so that they may better organize their college programs on a long range basis," Hill explained.

Seniors who have not as yet obtained jobs are also invited to speak with representatives from various organizations, Hill added.

"STUDENTS should visit a many exhibits and speak with a many representatives as possible to acquaint them with possible opportunities in all fields," Hill said.

# 4 Debaters Win Trophy

The women's debate team topped teams from 36 colleges and universities this weekend to win first place in the New York University Spring Forensic Festival.

The women debaters were awarded the Sweepstakes Trophy for accumulating the highest number of points in debate, persuasive speaking and after dinner speaking.

The affirmative debate team, composed of Arlene Weiner, senior in liberal arts from Hasbrock Heights, N.J., and Sharon Toffey, sophomore in psychology from Carlisle, defeated men's teams from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and Rochester Institute of Technology and a mixed team from Queens College. They lost only to a men's team from the University of South Carolina.

The negative team, composed of Dianne Lamb, junior in journalism from Arlington, Va., and Chris Irvin, senior in education from State College, won all their debates, defeating men's teams from Hunter College, Hamilton College and Seton Hall, plus a women's team from Albertus Magnus.

"I am sure that many students will be surprised to find opportunities for employment available in fields that may appear to be completely unrelated to their major," Hill continued.

Students will also have an opportunity to inquire about possible part-time and summer employment with the individual companies, he added.

"THE TOTAL COST of the project is expected to run over \$50,000," Hill said, "with the major costs being construction and shipment of exhibits and representatives' salaries." These expenses will be paid by the individual organizations, he said.

"One company has spent over \$10,000 on its exhibit alone," he added.

George N. P. Leetch, director of the University Placement Service, and his staff members assisted the ICCB in contacting the organizations, Hill said.

It is estimated that approximately 9,000 students visited display booths and spoke with representatives at a similar exhibition last year, he added.

# Coed Reassignment Forms Due

The deadline for women to apply for reassignment to their present rooms next fall is 5 p.m. today.

Housing forms should be submitted to the Assignment Office in Pollock Dining Hall, James S. Kline, head of the assignment division of the Department of Housing, said.

Every effort will be made to fulfill requests for reassignment, he said. When students apply for rooms which have been designated for junior residents, new freshmen or language living groups, they will be placed in nearby rooms, Kline said.

Women wishing a new room next fall should turn in their ap-

plications between May 7 and May 18. These applications will be placed in a drawing with seniors given priority.

Women should specify their second and third choices for room and residence hall and include in the upper left-hand corner of the form their dormitory name and room number. Roommate requests should be submitted together.
