

# Lions Rank High in Relay; Wettstone, Moorhead Set Pace

Penn State failed to win any of the coveted Championship of America relay races at the Penn Relays Friday and Saturday, but placed in seven events, ranking the Lions with some of the best teams in the gigantic Philadelphia meet.

"There were five or six real good teams there and Penn State was one of them," a pleased coach Chick Werner said after the meet. Jerry Wettstone and Steve Moorhead led the way in the Lions' fine showing. Wettstone high jumped 6'4" to finish in a three-way tie for first place. Ray Bury of Fairleigh-Dickinson and Grant Krow of Albright also figured in the tie.

Moorhead, after anchoring the four-mile relay team to second place in Friday's action, placed second in the 3000-meter steeplechase in 9:18.8. Villanova's Pat Traynor was first in the record time of 9:11.1. The olympic development steeplechase, which was run at the same time, was won by Iowa graduate Deacon Jones. Jones hit the tape in 9:10.6.

Ciro Risoldi wound up in a six-way tie for third place after pole vaulting 13'6". In the championship vault, Richard Plymale of West Point took three tries at the then-world-record 16'1", after set-

ting a new meet record of 15'8". His record would have been short-lived, however, since later in the day, Marine Lt. Dave Tork set a new world record of 16'2" in the Mt. San Antonio Relays in Walnut, Calif.

Tom Urbanik tossed the shot put 49'6" for fifth place and George Casey jumped 6'2" in the high jump to finish in a six-way tie for fourth. New York University won the mile and sprint relays and Michigan took the four-mile and two-mile. Abilene Christian just beat Villanova in the 440 relay after a terrific anchorman battle between ACC's olympian Earl Young and Villanova's 100-yard dash world recordholder, Frank Budd. Young received a better handoff and held a one-yard lead over Budd at the start of their 110-yard run and kept it to the tape although Budd gained slightly. Villanova managed to take the 880 relay.
