

Thinclads Meet Spartans In First Home Dual Meet

Fresh from fine showings in the Ohio and Penn Relay Carnivals, Penn State's track and field team will again try its ability against a single team this weekend.

The Lion thinclads meet Michigan State tomorrow in the first of a three dual-meet homestand. Pitt and the Quantico Marines will provide the competition on the following two Saturdays. Field events will get underway at 1:30 and running events at 2 p.m.

THUS FAR this season State has been much more fortunate in the two relay carnivals it has entered, than in its one dual meet. The thinclads were swamped, 89½ - 41½, by a strong Navy team in the first meet of the season, April 14.

The Lions bounced back after that disastrous meet and won first places in the three-mile and 3000-meter steeplechase, and placed in ten other events two weeks ago in the Ohio Relays.

Last Friday and Saturday State, although not winning any relays, placed in seven out of 11 events that it entered in the much tougher competition of the University of Pennsylvania's Penn Relays.

Michigan State's Gerald Young will be out to beat the Lions' Steve Moorhead in the mile when the Spartans invade Beaver Field tomorrow.

Moorhead nosed Young by a judge's decision last year in a triangular meet at East Lansing, Mich., after both runners were timed in 4:14.1 for the mile. State won the meet with 65½ points. The Spartans were second with 49½ and the other team, Ohio State, had 46.

MOORHEAD beat Young again when the two met in the steeple-

chase at the Ohio Relays two weeks ago. The Lion captain dethroned Young, the 1961 champion, with a 9:44.1 time for the 3000 meters.

Michigan State preferred the Drake Relays in Des Moines, Iowa to the Penn Relays last week. The Spartans placed second in the 480-shuttle hurdle relay, third in the 880-relay and fifth in ham.

Giants Topple Pirates, 8-4, For Ninth Straight Victory

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — National League-leading San Francisco took its ninth straight victory, an 8-4 conquest of Pittsburgh yesterday.

Jack Stanford went all the way for his third victory against one loss and the seventh consecutive complete game by a Giant pitcher. A crowd of 10,723 watched as the Giants rallied in the eighth to win.

The Pirates, losing their fourth straight here, scored on two-run homers by Dick Schofield in the third and pinch hitter Larry Elliot in the seventh.

THE GIANTS broke a 4-4 tie in the eighth with four runs off loser Harvey Haddix, now 1-1. Shortstop Dick Groat let Jose Pagan's grounder go through his legs and

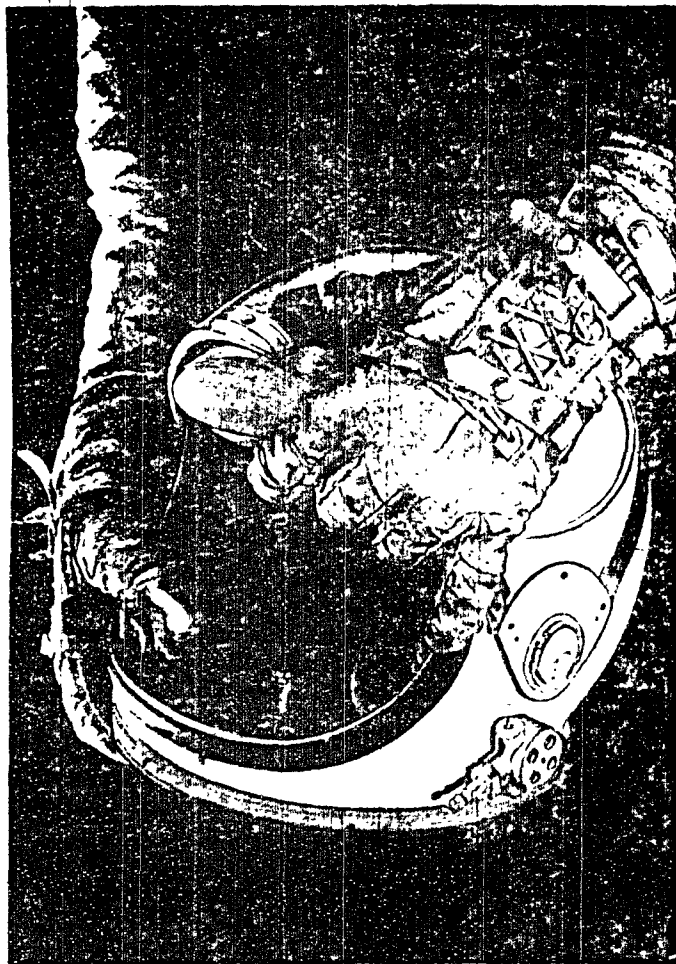
Jim Davenport singled him to third. Stanford popped for the first out, but Chuck Hiller lined a single between first and second to score Pagan.

Elroy Face came to the hill to be greeted by Willie Mays' double to the left field bullpen that tallied two more runs. Orlando Cepeda scored Mays with a single.

The Giants rained 18 hits off four Pirate pitchers, 14 of them singles. Two other Giant streaks were halted and a third was extended in the victory. For the first time in 17 games, no Giant homered.

Stanford threw wild on a bunt base hit in the third inning for San Francisco's first error in nine games and 335 consecutive chances.

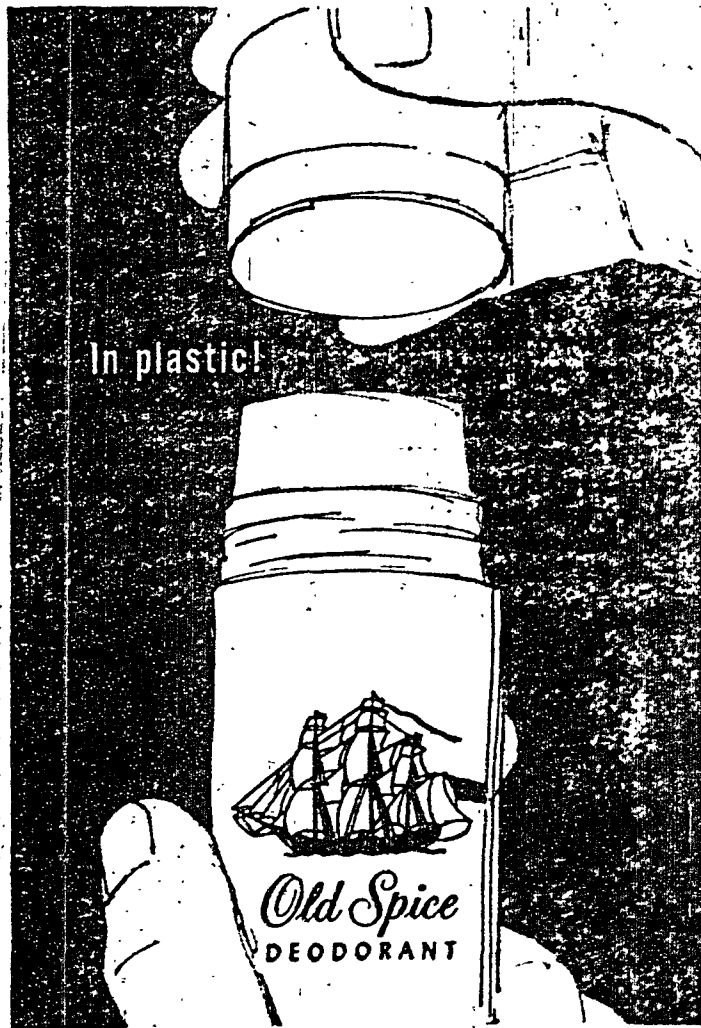
