

Women Tennis Stars to Hold Clinic Prof Snarf Entries Announced

Four nationally prominent women tennis players will hold a tennis clinic at 2 p.m. tomorrow at the tennis courts near the ice skating rink.

Mrs. Margaret Osborne Dupont, Miss Margaret Varner, Mrs. F. A. C. Vosters, Jr. and Miss Belmar Gunderson will conduct the clinic, which is being sponsored by the WRA Tennis Club.

An exhibition by the four women will open the clinic and will be followed by the clinic from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. In the event of rain, the clinic will be held in White Hall. An open reception will be held at 4:30 p.m. in the gameroom in White Hall.

MRS. DUPONT has won the National Women's Doubles Championship every year since 1941. She has also won the Women's Doubles at Wimbledon, England, five times. The last time was in 1961. She has been a member of

the U.S. Wightman Cup Team on tennis players and third in the since 1946 and the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association Sears Cup of Team since 1953.

In 1962, Miss Varner was ranked first in the U.S. Doubles with Mrs. Dupont. She was the Middle States Ladies Singles Champion in 1960-1961. She has been a member of the Wightman Cup Team since 1961 and the Sears Cup Team since 1958.

MRS. VOSTERS is ranked among the nation's first ten women Cup and Sears Cup teams.

The annual Prof Snarf Contest, sponsored by the World University Service, will start Monday and continue through Friday, Olga Seastrom, campus co-chairman, said yesterday.

Miss Gunderson is currently doing graduate work at the University for her masters in Physical Education. She is ranked fourth in Women's Doubles and twelfth in Women's Singles. She is also a member of the Wightman Cup and Sears Cup teams.

The professors entered were nominated by the student councils in each college. They are Tjen-Hsi Cheng, agriculture; Robert F. Schmalz, mineral industries; Henry A. Finch, Division of Counseling; Franklin H. Cook, business administration; Mary L. Willard, chemistry-physics; Helen I.

Snyder, education; Maurice S. Gjesdahl, engineering; Margaret N. Fringer, physical education; Joseph J. Rubin, liberal arts; and Mary E. Fuqua, home economics. By contributing money, students may vote for their favorite professor. Votes cost a penny each and students may vote as often as they wish, Miss Seastrom said. Voting tables will be set up on the ground floor of the Hetzel Union Building and on the Mall. Proceeds from the contest will go to the WUS.

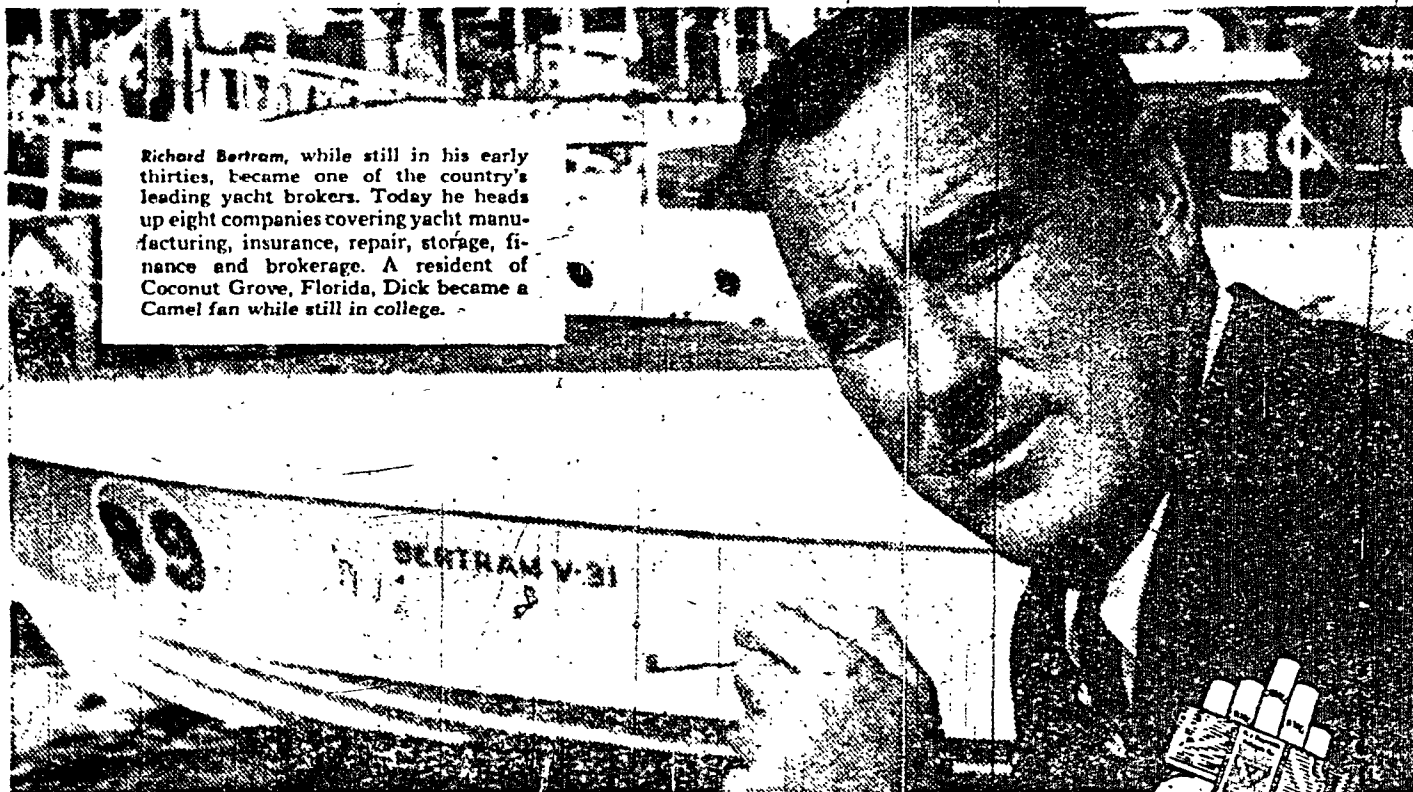
