Folk music and dances from around-the-world will be included in the International Folk Festival to be held at 1:30 p.m. today in the Hetzel Union ballroom. Michael Winters, World University Service program chairman, said yesterday.

During the WUS-sponsored Folk Festival, the winner of the Prof Snarf Contest will be announced, Winters said.

AT THAT TIME, he said, recognition will also be given to the group which won the Penny Mile contest and to the dormitory area which has raised the most money for WUS during the year.

Participating in the International Folk Festival will be

Interlandia, a Hillel dance group, the Schuhplattler and several individuals from the Cosmopolitan Club, Winters said.

The individuals who will present numbers during the program are Ken Kaku, graduate student in civil engineering from Japan, and David Vaughan, graduate student in geochemistry from East Yorkshire, England.

KAKU WILL do a traditional Japanese dance from the Noh-drama. Vaughan will do two folk dances from Great Britain, one called "Nightingale," and a Clog dance called "Lady's Pleasure."

In addition, Kuskequa, a group from the Cosmopolitan Club, will do an American Indian dance, Winters said.

Lancaster Professor To Speak at Chapel

The Rev. Robert W. Duke, associate professor of homiletics at the Lancaster Theological Seminary, will speak on "Are You He Who is to Come, or Shall We Look for Another?" at the Chapel service at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab.

The Chapel Choir, under the direction of Willa C. Taylor, will sing "How Lovely is Thy Dwelling Place" by Johannes Brahms.

Leonard Raver, Chapel organist, will play "Three Choral Preludes," "Chorale Prelude and Fugue on O Traurigkeit" and "Prelude and Fugue in G Minor," all by Brahms.

DUKE, an ordained Congregational Christian clergyman, is a graduate of Brother College, Madison, N.J., and taught philosophy for one year in that school.

He graduated magna cum laude from Drew Theological Seminary.

In 1957, Duke was selected by the United States Air Force to conduct a preaching mission in the Middle East, Turkey and Italy, to the armed forces and their families stationed there. In 1959, he received a distinguished service citation from the armed forces for services rendered on that preaching mission.

Lewisburg Speech Set by Rockwell

The self-styled head of the American Nazi Party, George Lincoln Rockwell, has scheduled a speech from the steps of the Lewisburg Post Office at 2 p.m. tomorrow.

In February, Rockwell was to have spoken to a student group at Bucknell University in Lewisburg, but his address was cancelled when university officials withdrew the invitation of the students.

Rockwell then attempted to speak off-campus but was escorted from Lewisburg after police officials said they could not guarantee his safety.

Several times thereafter he announced plans to speak in Lewisburg, each time cancelling at the last minute because of poor road conditions between that city and his party headquarters in Arlington, Va.

Snetsinger Receives Aid

Dr. Robert J. Snetsinger, assistant professor of entomology, has received a \$200 grant from the National Pest Control Association to support his research on millepedes.

He is studying the life history of these multi-legged bugs, which are members of the arthropod family, with the ultimate aim of finding some means of controlling them.

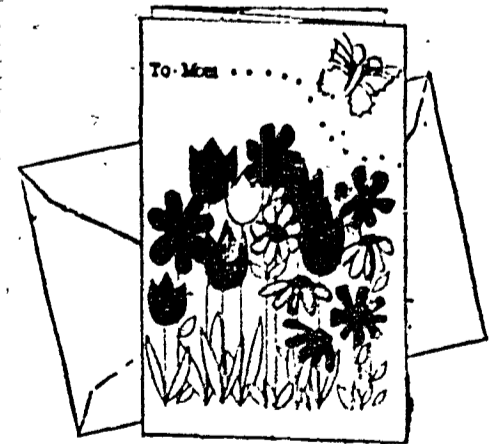
