

Emphasis on Individual Stars As Thinclads Host Underdog Pitt

The emphasis will be on individual performances rather than team scores when the Penn State thinclads take on Pitt at Beaver Field this afternoon. Field events start at 1:30, running events at 2.

Neither team has won a meet this season, but Pitt is expected to be a definite underdog. The Panthers lost their first dual meet to Miami of Ohio, 64½-56½, and last Saturday placed second to Syracuse in a triangular meet. Syracuse had 68 points, Pitt had 53 and West Virginia had 41.

State, likewise has lost two meets, but to powerhouses, Navy and Michigan State.

IF COACH Chick Werner's plans for this afternoon turn out as expected, the Lions' star distance runner, Gerry Norman, is going to have quite a day. Werner's plans call for Norman to run under 8:58 in the two-mile race.

"This will get him ready for the Coliseum Relays and break the school record at the same time," Werner explained.

The Coliseum Relays referred to is an invitational meet being held in the Los Angeles Coliseum Friday night. Last week Norman was invited to run the 5000-meter event there against world-wide competition.

The record referred to is owned by Dick Engelbrink, who set the two-mile mark of 8:58.9 in 1959.

Pitt's two-milers, Bob Tarkany and Bill Mocnik, haven't run below 9:50 this season and probably won't give Norman any competition. Lion captain Steve Moor-

head is entered in the long race along with Norman.

"MOORHEAD IS going to set the pace for the first mile-and-a-half," Werner explained. The coach also plans to enter Norman and Moorhead in the mile run along with Howie Deardorff.

"I'm counting on Deardorff to win the mile," Werner said, "and the other two (Norman and Moorhead) to take second and third just as a warmup for the two-mile. Deardorff should also take the half-mile.

"Our sprinters have been running good dashes all year," the Lion coach said. "But Michigan State's sprinters killed us." Popp placed third in the 100 last week despite a 9.8 clocking. Wayne was fourth in 9.9.

"It's discouraging for our men," Werner said. "They run under 10 seconds and get beat anyway. In my book anyone who can run under 10 seconds is a good sprinter."

POPP AND WAYNE will be running against Pitt's Bob Shana-

felt and Steve Munter, both of whom have been hitting around 9.9-10 seconds all season.

The State 14' pole vault record has to go one of these weeks and this one looks as good as any, with three men in the event who have been threatening the height all season.

The Panthers' Ron Weiers holds the Pitt Stadium vault record of 14' and the Lions' Ron Beard is co-holder of the Penn State mark at the same height. State's Ciro Risoldi also has cleared the height in practice.

Stickmen Seek 7th Victory; Host 'Road Winless' Garnet

Swarthmore hasn't won an away game this season and Lion lacrosse coach Dick Pencek is hoping the pattern won't change this afternoon in Beaver Stadium.

Pencek's stickmen go after their seventh win at 2 and unless Swarthmore comes up with its best game of the season, the chances are State may have a pretty easy time of it.

The Garnet has a 5-4 record, but all of the wins have come against weak teams and all at home. They beat Loyola, Franklin & Marshall, Stevens, Lafayette and Drexel. Away from home they lost to Delaware, Penn, Washington and Lehigh.

STATE, MEANWHILE, has beaten two teams that stopped the Garnet—Penn and Lehigh—and also topped Loyola and Lafayette. Other Lion wins came over Rutgers and Washington & Lee. Maryland and Syracuse were victorious over the Lions.

A victory this afternoon for State would give them the Penn-Del championship. Wednesday the Lions captured the Middle Atlantic Conference championship with goal.

a 4-0 record by trouncing Lehigh, 14-7.

Besides the two championships, State is gunning for its best record in history. The 1946 and 1955 teams won seven games and a victory today and a win next Saturday against Colgate would establish a record.

The victory against Lehigh assured State of its first winning season since 1959 when the Lions were 5-4-1. In 1960 State was 1-9 and last year the record was 4-6.

EVEN THOUGH the stickmen had little trouble against Lehigh, Pencek was far from pleased with their performance.

Garnet coach Brooke Cottman has 11 lettermen back from last year's team which lost to State, 9-0. Pete Brandt, Nick Fedoruk, Bill Morehouse and Jack Riggs bolster the defense while Dave Walter, John Nesbitt, Bill Jewett, Bob Hickey and Ben Cooper are from the midfield corps. Carl Uehlein is the goalie and Dick Kittredge is the lone returning attack letterman.

Pencek will start the regular lineup which shows Andy Lockhart, Dave Finchbaugh and Dick Swensen in the defense; Tom Hayes, Lou Meier and Bill Charon at midfield; Dick Seelig, Howie Spencer and John Meisel at attack, and Vinnie Tedesco at goal.
