

Study Abroad Plan Termed 'Good'; ROTC Will Parade Tonight
Matson Praises French Program

A general evaluation of the success of the Study Abroad program at the University of Strasbourg, France, has been termed "good" by Margaret B. Matson, associate professor of sociology...

The students have adjusted well to the Study Abroad program and are benefiting from it, Mrs. Matson said. They are self-reliant and resourceful and have been co-operative, she added.

President Eric A. Walker, who visited the University of Cologne in Germany during the early part of the term, said that the 41 students studying there have been received well. He said that he found a tremendous interest in the program on the part of the citizens as well as the newspapers and radio.

WALKER ADDED that he thinks the University has started something which may grow considerably and be a great deal of credit to Penn State.

Dagobert de Levie, director of the Study Abroad program who is accompanying the students studying in Germany, said that the "students are pursuing serious academic study and with good results."

"The program is wonderful," Patricia Phillips, sophomore in secondary education from Mount Joy who is studying in Germany, said. "It's teaching us how much we didn't know," she added.

GENERAL COMMENTS on the food at the University of Strasbourg ranged from "not bad" to "I'll never again complain about the Penn State food."

President Walker, commenting on what he has seen of the program in Cologne, said that he thinks the University really has something which may grow considerably and be a great deal of credit to Penn State.

Over 1,100 marchers will participate in the annual Armed Forces Day Parade in State College at 6:30 tonight, Lt. Col. William Geelan, Armed Forces project officer, said yesterday.

The parade will form on Curtin Road on campus and move south onto College Avenue and pass the reviewing stand at the intersection of S. Allen Street and College Avenue.

TRAFFIC WILL be blocked off on College Avenue from Garner Street to Burrowes Street from 6:20 to 7:15 p.m. tonight because of the parade.

Curtin Road in the vicinity of East Halls will be blocked after 5:30 p.m. as the parade forms, and Shortlidge Road will be closed from 6:20 to 7 p.m.

Burrowes Road from College Avenue to Pollock Road will be blocked from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. The official reviewing party for the parade will include Rep. James E. Van Zandt, R-Pa., guest of honor; Brig. Gen. Lester S. Hamel, USMC (ret.), parade grand mar-

shal; and Mariesta Patterson, the 1962 Mil Ball Queen. REPRESENTATIVES from the University ROTC units will march in the parade.

The Army ROTC unit will be the Provisional Battalion Staff, the Army ROTC band and a company of Army ROTC seniors. Two ROTC Ranger Platoons and the Pershing Rifles will serve as color guard.

The Navy ROTC contingent will include the staff, the Navy ROTC Drum and Bugle Corps, three companies of midshipmen, the

Navy Color Guard and the Navy Drill Team. The Air Force ROTC representation will include the staff, the Air Force ROTC band, the Air Force ROTC Standard Drill Team, Color Guard, Angel Flight and the Air Force Trick Drill Platoon.
