Dr. Hans Hofmann, professor of University Chapel of Zurich. Subcommittee Dismisses Two Students

A sophomore coed and a freshman were dismissed from the University for "conduct injurious to the standard of morals of the student body," Daniel R. Leasure, assistant dean of men, said yesterday.

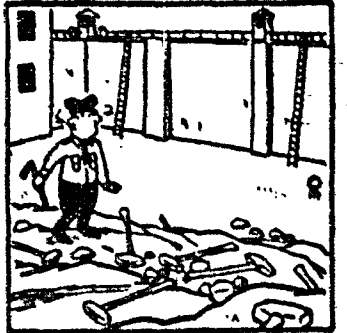
President Eric A. Walker approved the dismissal which was recommended by the Senate Subcommittee on Discipline. Dismissal of a student is the most serious penalty the subcommittee can give in a disciplinary case and also the only penalty which requires the approval of the President, Leasure said. Readmission of a dismissed student must be approved by the President upon recommendation of the dean of the college in which the student is enrolled, Leasure said.

THE INCIDENT involving the two students occurred at Bucknell University recently. Bucknell officials reported that the students had illegally entered a parked automobile in the area and were found in the back seat "in a compromising situation," Leasure said. They were discovered by school officials two hours after the coed, a guest in the Bucknell Residence Halls, was required to be in the hall. The male student was not a registered guest at Bucknell, Leasure said.

Leasure added that the jurisdiction of the University in cases involving disciplinary action is not confined to the physical limitations of the University. The University has jurisdiction over a student's actions as long as he is enrolled at the University. This includes vacation periods also, Leasure added.

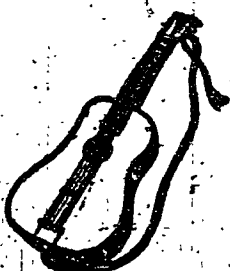
