Lion Golfers Meet Lehigh To Close Home Schedule

Penn State's golf team will make its last home appearance of the season this afternoon, entertaining weak Lehigh on the University course.

Only West Virginia has kept the Lions (8-1) from an undefeated season. The Mountaineers upset coach Joe Boyle's linksmen, 5-4, on a narrow Morgantown course two weeks ago.

Team captain and senior Bob Swahn will perform competitively for the last time on the University links. The course

best record for the Lions, 7-2. According to Boyle, the tall lanky sophomore is one of the most improved golfers on the Nittany squad.

"Swahn has always been a tremendous worker," Boyle said a few weeks ago. "He has worked as hard as anyone we've ever had here. In previous years he was over-desirous. But now he knows how to steady himself down and play as he has always been potentially capable."



Academic difficulties and study pressures deprived Lehigh's linksmen of three returning lettermen this year, juniors Carl Claus, Bob Fuerst, and Lee Owens. The losses put a damper on what was supposed to be a "rebuilding year" for Engineer coach Bill Leckonby.

The only returning regulars are captain Don DeMooy and Karl Fuerst, who played in the number one and six positions for most of last year. Last season the Lion golfers nipped Lehigh, 4-3, but Boyle expects little trouble this year.

Swahn has turned in a respectable 6-2 record this year, but has lost his last three starts. In the Eastern Intercollegiate Golf Association championships at Cornell University last week, Swahn and sophomore teammate Dave Liebau were two of sixteen golfers eligible to enter competition for individual honors. Swahn was eliminated in the first round of play; Liebau advanced to the semi-finals.

"WE'RE MUCH stronger and they're much weaker," he explained. "They beat Penn, 4-3, earlier this year, but other than that they haven't shown too much."

Hot weather is expected to prevail for today's meet, the final of the season for the Engineers. Sunny skies with temperatures ranging in the 90's should provide an ideal golf atmosphere. The course is in excellent condition.

BOYLE WILL go with his regular lineup today. Jim Tabor, unbeaten this year in regular match competition, will play number one man, followed by Roland Gartner, Swahn, Liebau, Bill Robinson, and Paul Hummer.

Following today's match, the Lion linksmen will take to the road, completing their season at Pitt Tuesday and Cornell Saturday.

Playoff Berth at Stake

Baseballers Meet Pitt in Two

The hopes of a whole season are on the line this afternoon when District 2 hopefuls Pitt and Penn State meet on the Veteran's Hospital Field at Leech Farm.

The Lions and the Panthers are two of the main contenders for the District 2 playoffs, but a defeat today in either game of the doubleheader could eliminate both of them from consideration.

The district selection committee, which was scheduled to meet Monday in Scranton to pick four teams for the playoffs, will not meet until Thursday. According to an official source, the move was made "in order to permit the teams to get in a few more games." State coach Joe Bedenk was scheduled to be a member of the committee but will be unable to be at the meeting because the Lions play Delaware Thursday at Newark. The committee will also select the site and dates of the tournament.

St. John's, Seton Hall and the Middle Atlantic Conference champion will probably fill three of the four playoff positions to be

chosen. That leaves just one slot open for the Lions, Pitt, Lafayette or several others to fight about.

PITT COACH Bobby Lewis will start lefthanded ace John Carlisle in one of the games this afternoon, but isn't settled on a starter for the second contest.

At that, he is one up on State coach Joe Bedenk. The veteran Lion mentor was forced to use the ace of his staff, Bob Fenton, in the Lions' 8-4 win over Bucknell Thursday and Fenton may not be ready to pitch again so soon.

Righthander Marlin Biesecker started the Bucknell game, but was able to get only one man out while giving up three home runs to the supposedly light-hitting Bisons.

That leaves only Dick Stellman, Dick Noe, Jeff Spanier, Dave Bergey and Chet Mozier in the bullpen. STELLMAN IS the only one of the lot who has pitched with any semblance of effectiveness this year. The little righthander has been used mostly in relief, however, and was knocked out of the box in his only starting appearance.

Both Spanier and Bergey were ineffective in their starting turns. Noe has pitched only briefly in relief and Mozier hasn't thrown in a game yet this season.

Aside from the questionable pitching picture, the Lions may be in their top shape of the year. They have apparently conquered the error trouble that has plagued them most of the season,

committing only one miscue in their win over Bucknell.

THE LIONS are also beginning to hit the ball with some regularity. They had 14 hits against Bucknell.

Shortstop Johnny Phillips, the team batting leader all year long, and Roger Kochman have been wielding hot bats as the Nittanies make their stretch drive.

The Lions will probably go with the same lineup today that they used in their win over Bucknell, unless Bedenk starts Al Gursky in left field.

That move would have Gursky in left, with Kochman moving to first base in place of weak-hitting Pete Liske.

The Lions wind up their regular season schedule with a single game against Temple on Beaver Field Tuesday and an away game Thursday with Delaware at Newark.

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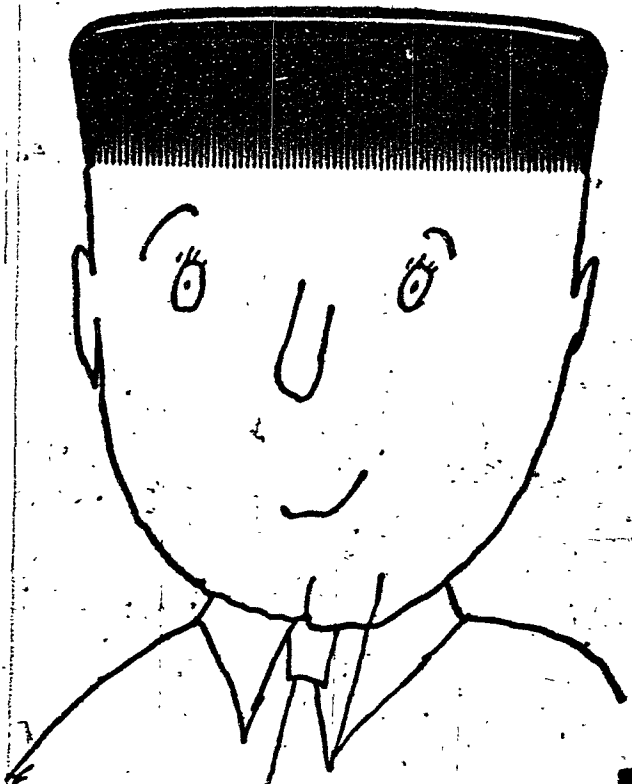
