

# Deardorff Lone State Qualifier

VILLANOVA, Pa., May 25—

Penn State's Howie Deardorff was the only Lion to qualify in time trials run in the first day of action at the IC4A Championships at Villanova Stadium. All finals are scheduled for tomorrow.

Deardorff placed first in his heat of the 880-yard run with a 1:51.4 clocking. John Reilly of Georgetown leads the field with a 1:50.2 and Frank Tomeo of Fordham has the third best time, 1:54.1.

REILLY HAS a season best of 1:48.7 and will be shooting for the IC4A record (1:49.1) in the finals tomorrow. Deardorff has posted a time of 1:50.6 in dual meet competition and could challenge the Georgetown star.

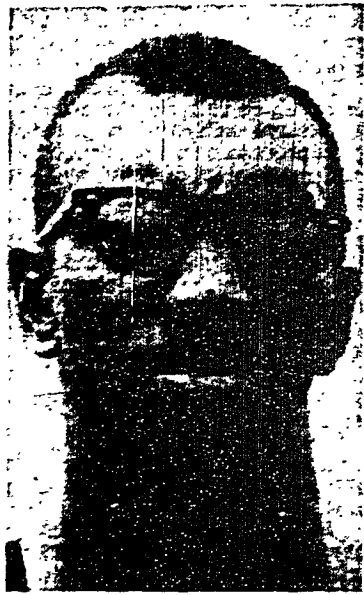
Lion shot putter Tom Urbanik failed to qualify with a 50' put as New York University's sensational sophomore, Gary Gubner, heaved the 16-pound weight 62'2 1/4" for a new meet record.

Billy Joe helped favored Villanova's chances by holding second in the shot at 59'11 3/4".

Villanova sprinters, Frank Budd and Paul Drayton, led the 100 and 220-yard dashes as expected. They finished the short sprint in 9.5 and 9.7, and the longer run in 20.6 and 21.0, respectively.

State's Steve Popp ran a 22.8 for the 220.

Art Thomas of Yale led in the broad jump at 23'4 1/2". State's Bob Grantham leaped 21'8" in a losing cause. He also missed qualifying in the hop, step and

jump, led by John Vincent of Boston College at 47'8 3/4".

Neither Grantham nor teammate George Barnhill ran the 120-yard high hurdles fast enough to qualify.

Mike Miller ran a 54.7 in the 440-yard hurdles to place far behind the leaders, Morgan State's Lawson Smartt with a 52.7 and Yale's Jay Luck with a 53.7.

Dick Walker and Ciro Risoldi in the javelin and John Courtney in

the discus were completely outclassed as Villanova's Doug Kerr threw the spear 224'10 1/2" and Gubner spun the discus 168'10 1/2".

In tomorrow's finals, State's

Gerry Norman will line up against Yale's Bob Mack in the three-mile run. Norman is favored and probably will break the IC4A record of 14:11.8. His best time for the distance is 13:56.

Steve Moorhead will run the 3,000-meter steeplechase against last year's winner, Pat Traynor of Villanova. Moorhead's best time is 9:16. Traynor is slightly favored with a best of 9:11.1.

Moorhead and Deardorff are entered in the mile run as is Reilly, who has run a 4:01.9 this season. His time is far below the record of 4:07.8, held by Villanova's Ron

Delany. Moorhead and Deardorff have recorded times of 4:10.5 and 4:11.4, respectively.

Ron Beard, holder of the Penn State pole vault record at 14'5" and Risoldi, with a best of 14'4 1/4", will face strong opposition in Villanova's Rolando Cruz and Mary-

land's John Baltiza, who consistently vault over 15'.

High jump record-holder, Jerry Wettstone, and George Casey face a strong field led by Boston University's John Thomas, whose season's best is 6'10".

Wettstone's record is 6'6 1/4" and Casey's best jump is 6'5 1/4".

## Lions, Ithaca Meet in Playoffs

Next weekend's District 2 playoffs on Beaver Field pit Penn State against a team that humiliated the Lions earlier this year.

The Nittanies (10-3) meet unbeaten Ithaca (15-0) in the first game of a doubleheader Friday. St. John's (22-1) and Gettysburg (11-5) clash in the second game. The winners play Saturday.

ITHACA ROMPED to an easy 14-5 win over the Lions on Beaver Field early in the season, but things may be a little bit different this time.

Joe Bedenk's team contributed six errors to the Bomber cause, giving up 12 runs in three innings. Off the Lions' performance in the last three weeks of the season, another showing like that would

have to be considered highly improbable.

The Nittanies have settled down considerably in the field, committing just six errors in their last five games.

Lion shortstop Johnny Phillips has been having a horrible season at field, but the Jan'ky captain leads the team in hitting.

Bedenk called Phillips the best shortstop in the East last year, but the Lion star developed a habit of waiting for the ball and it has cost him dearly.

"John had a habit of charging the ball," Bedenk explains, "His coach last summer thought he was over-charging, so he had John

sit back and wait for the hop. He is off balance now and can't reach the ball."

ITHACA COMPLETED its third unbeaten season in Bucky Freeman's 28 years with a 4-0 victory over Army Wednesday.

Roger Fräize (6-0) and Dick Lindamer (5-0) are the top pitchers for the Bombers. Neither man pitched against the Lions.

This is the ninth playoff in 13 years for the Lions. They won the playoffs in 1952, 1957 and 1959.

The 1957 team lost in the finals of the College World Series to California. State pitcher Cal Emery was named the outstanding player of the tournament. Emery is now a first baseman for Rochester in the International League.

The 1952 and 1959 teams finished fourth in the eight-team fields at Omaha, Neb., the scene of the last 12 NCAA tourneys.
