

Delta Upsilon Wins IM Title For Fourth Consecutive Year

For the fourth year in a row, Delta Upsilon reigns as fraternity all-point champion in intramural athletics.

DU won the track championship Wednesday evening and in the process retained the E. C. Bischoff Memorial Trophy, given to the fraternity that polls the highest number of points during the intramural season.

With all events now complete, DU totaled 142 points. Phi Gamma Delta was second with 998 points, followed by Phi Delta Theta (907) and Beta Theta Pi (902).

THE TRACK CROWN that DU won was the second title this year for the champions. However, it was consistency that won the championship. In almost every sport DU gained the playoffs, picking up valuable points.

Going into the final night of track, Phi Gam had a chance to beat DU, provided they could finish high in the three running events.

In the 100-yard dash won by John Robinson of Omega Psi Phi in 10.6, Bob Kline of DU finished third compared to a fifth place finish by John Androski of Phi Gam. Dieter Heinze of Sigma Pi finished second.

In the 440-yard dash, Myron Kerstetter of Delta Chi nipped Arnold Eversole of Theta Delta Chi and Ken Staub of DU. The winning time for the event was 52.9. Don Caum of Phi Gam finished fourth in the race.

THE THIRD PLACE that Staub took in the 440 was enough to clinch the title, but the DU's went on to take the 880-yard relay in 1:36.3, edging Omega Psi Phi. Despite a great individual performance by Neal Biege of Clearfield, Nittany 31-32 won the in-

dependent track title. Biege won the 440-yard dash in 52.2 and ran a fast 23.3 lead-off on his teams relay win. Fred Owens of Nittany 23-24, the independent overall point winners, won the 100-yard dash in 10.8.

Ward Cops \$124,515

Patterson, Liston to Battle In Comiskey Park, Sept. 25

CHICAGO (AP)—Champion Floyd Patterson will fight Sonny Liston Tuesday, Sept. 25, before boxing fans who will pay from \$10 to \$100 to watch their heavyweight title bout in Comiskey Park.

Those major details were settled yesterday, and they were approved quickly by the Illinois Athletic Commission.

The announcement was made by Al Bolan, vice president of Championship Sports Inc., which has the two boxers under contract, and Irving Schoenwald, Chicagoan who is acting as promoter of the match.

Tickets will be priced at \$100, \$50, \$30 and \$10, and all the 57,000 seats will be sold on a reserve basis.

The net gate receipts will be split up this way: Patterson 45 per cent, Liston 12 1/2, and Championship Sports 42 1/2.

Liston has been guaranteed a minimum of \$200,000—an amount that Bolan termed "the most any challenger ever has been guaranteed."

He said his organization is asking bids for the rights to handle the closed circuit telecast to theaters, and arenas across the country.

Bolan also said the fight will be carried by radio, but he does not know whether the Chicago area will be included.

Mays, Cepeda, Chacon, Craig Sent 'Fight' Invites

NEW YORK (AP)—Madison Square Garden officials sent an invitation this week to Willie Mays and Orlando Cepeda of the San Francisco Giants and Elio Chacon and Roger Craig of the New York Mets to come to watch a fight instead of staging one.

They were the four leading antagonists in the big scrap at San Francisco Sunday, when the Giants took a doubleheader from the Mets.

"We've sent them all invitations to the fight Saturday night, when both teams will be in New York," a Garden spokesman said.

"We'd like to have them come and sit together, real friendly like. Of course, if they're still mad by then, the ring is always available."

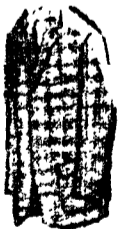
