University Grads from 10 Classes Will Meet at Reunions June 14-16

University alumni of 10 different classes will reminisce with classmates about college days gone by at the 1962 class reunions June 14-16.

Among the general reunion activities planned are the Alumni Institute sessions, with talks given by professors on timely topics; the All-Class Luncheon, with box lunches and an entertainment program; campus bus tours and the Alumni Parade.

Special class events will include class get-reacquainted parties and banquets.

ALUMNI and guests, with the exception of the "Pioneers," will be housed in Simmons and McElwain residence halls. The "pioneers," alumni who were graduated from the University 50 or more years ago, will stay in the Nittany Lion Inn.

Between 1,500 and 2,000 alumni and guests are expected to attend the reunion.

A highlight of the program will be the presentation of the 1962 Distinguished Alumnus Awards and the Penn State Woman of the Year Award by President Eric A. Walker. Walker will also speak on "The State of the University."

Registration for all classes will begin at 1:30 p.m. June 14 in the Hetzel Union Building and continue through June 15 and 16.

A **COLOR** slide presentation, depicting the University through the years will open the reunion activities at 8 p.m., April 14 in

the HUB assembly room. An informal reception on the HUB terrace will follow.

The classes of 1907, 1912, 1917, 1922, 1927, 1932, 1937, 1942, 1947, 1952 and the Pioneers will participate in the reunion.

70 Engineers To Hold Institute

The third summer Institute on Effective Teaching for Engineering Teachers will be held here from August 26 to September 8.

Seventy engineering teachers will participate in the program, supported by a \$64,000 grant from the Ford Foundation and co-sponsored by the American Society for Engineering Education.

The teachers will be trained in fundamental principles and effective teaching methods.

A staff of engineering teachers and psychologists will be present at the program. Dr. Otis E. Lancaster, George Westinghouse professor of engineering education, will direct the program and Dr. C. R. Carpenter, director of the Division of Academic Research and Services, will serve as assistant.

Lancaster said that about 35 engineering schools are now conducting similar programs during the year. He has been visiting the institutions to obtain ideas for their improvement.

Cloudy, Cooler Weather Predicted

A brief, but noisy thunder-shower announced the arrival of cooler and drier air yesterday afternoon. The warm and humid tropical air was pushed south of the Commonwealth by the cool air.

Temperatures this weekend are forecast to average considerably lower than those of recent days. Night readings should be quite chilly, and frost is possible in some

of the low-lying areas. Mostly cloudy skies, some sunshine and cooler weather is indicated for today. The high temperature will be near 72 degrees.

Clearing skies and cooler weather are forecast for tonight, and a low of 48 is expected.

Tomorrow should be sunny and pleasant. The high should be about 70.

President Eric A. Walker will speak on "Science: A Faith in a University" at the baccalaureate service for graduating seniors at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab.

The service is replacing the non-denominational Chapel service which is usually held at this time. The public is invited to attend, although the service is designed primarily for the seniors.

At the service tomorrow, part of the center section of Schwab will be reserved for members of the senior class.

The Chapel Choir, under the direction of Willa C. Taylor and James W. Beach, will sing "If thou but suffer God to guide thee" by Georg Neumark and "Psalm 90" by Ralph Vaughan Williams.

LEONARD RAVER, Chapel organist, will play "Dialogue," "Fugue" and "Recite," all by N. de Grigny. He will also play "Chorale in E Major" by Cesar Franck and "Litanies" by Jegan Alain.
