

# Profs Given Leaves of Absence Grads Named To Staff Parks

An academic exodus may appear to occur this fall as members of the faculty appointed visiting professors at other colleges or granted leaves for research depart for these tasks.

**R. WALLACE BREWSTER**, professor of political science, will serve at Haverford College. He is the author of numerous articles in the field of political science and of a textbook, "Government in Modern Society."

Hugh M. Davison, professor of educational research, has been granted a leave of absence for the fall term. He will spend six weeks touring Europe and visiting European universities.

Davison will be conducting research in school administration.

Joseph L. Grucci, associate professor of English composition, has been granted a leave for the period of Sept. 1 to Aug. 31, 1963.

Grucci will spend most of this time in Italy, particularly in Florence and Rome. He will be working on his own poetry, as well as translating works of contemporary Italian poets including Nobel Prize winner Quasimodo, Ungaretti, Saba and Montale, who translated T. S. Eliot's "Wasteland" into Italian.

A. William Hajjar, professor of architecture, has been granted a

year's leave to practice in the Philadelphia architectural firm of Vincent Kling.

Boris J. Kochanowsky, professor of mining engineering, has been granted a leave for the fall and spring terms. He will spend his leave in Europe doing research on blasting and the economics of mining engineering.

William M. Lepley, director of laboratories in the Department of Psychology, has been given a leave for the 1963 spring and summer terms. He plans to visit psychology laboratories in the United States and abroad and to study at Trinity College, Dublin, Ireland.

While there, he will review the historical origins of laboratory science and will do research in contemporary experimental psychology.

**NEIL A. McNALL**, associate professor of American history, will do research on the career of a New York State land speculator, John Grieg, who was active in the early 19th century. McNall has been granted leave from Jan. 1 to June 30, 1963.

M. F. Mallette, professor of agricultural and biological chemistry, will be visiting professor at the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, Canada, from March 18 to Sept. 17, 1963.

Frederick B. Marbut, professor of journalism, has been given a leave from Sept. 1 to March 15, 1963, to serve as visiting professor of journalism at the National University of Nicaragua, Managua, Nicaragua, under a grant of the Smith-Mundt Act.

**PAUL L. MICHAEL**, associate professor of engineering research, at the University's Ordnance Research Laboratory, has been granted a year's leave to work at the Institute of Gas Technology, in Chicago, Ill.

While serving as a consultant to the institute, he has helped develop a gas leak detector for pipe mains. He will spend the year helping to get the detector ready for production.

Joseph Rubin, professor of American literature, has been given a leave for the winter and spring terms of the 1962-63 academic year. He plans to complete an edition of "The Poetry and Prose of Anne Bradstreet" and to begin a study project entitled "Growth of Walt Whitman's Mind."

S. Leonard Rubinstein, associate professor of English, will devote a leave for winter and spring terms to writing fiction. He is the author of a novel, "The Battle Done," published in 1954. The book has been published in Eng-

land and has been reprinted in paperback editions.

Ruth C. Silva, professor of political science, will develop standards for state legislature apportionment during a leave of absence from Jan. 1 to June 30.

The subject has become of particular interest since the recent Supreme Court decision on the matter, Dr. Silva said. Her research will not be devoted to a specific state, but will cover overall aspects of the issue.

Gordon R. Smith, associate professor of English, has received a Fulbright Fellowship and will teach at the Royal University of Malta on the island of Malta from September to June, 1963. Smith is a specialist in Shakespearean literature.

Arthur R. Woodward, associate professor of physics, will do research in polymer physics at Queen Mary College of the University of London, England, from Sept. 1 to Aug. 31, 1963. He was recently awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship.

**PHILIP YOUNG**, professor of American literature, has been awarded a Fulbright Fellowship to lecture in Italy from January to June, 1963. He will deliver a series of lectures on American literature at Italian universities, including Rome, Pisa, Bologna, Milan and Florence.

Two University graduates have been selected to administer two of Pennsylvania's four state park regions which were recently established by the Department of Forests and Waters, Maurice K. Goddard, forests and waters secretary, said.

William Hollenbaugh, who received a bachelor and master of science degrees in forest management from the University, has been appointed as the park superintendent for the northern region of the state.

Karl Thomson, who has been appointed as the eastern regional parks superintendent, received a bachelor's degree in forestry from the University.

Goddard said that the creation of these four state park regions will enable his department to administer more efficiently Pennsylvania's ever-growing park system. He added that there are 73 state parks and 140 recreational areas in the state.

"State park attendance, which has been increasing rapidly in recent years, will mean the addition of even more park facilities in the years to come," Goddard said. "This makes closer administration of added recreational areas necessary," he added.

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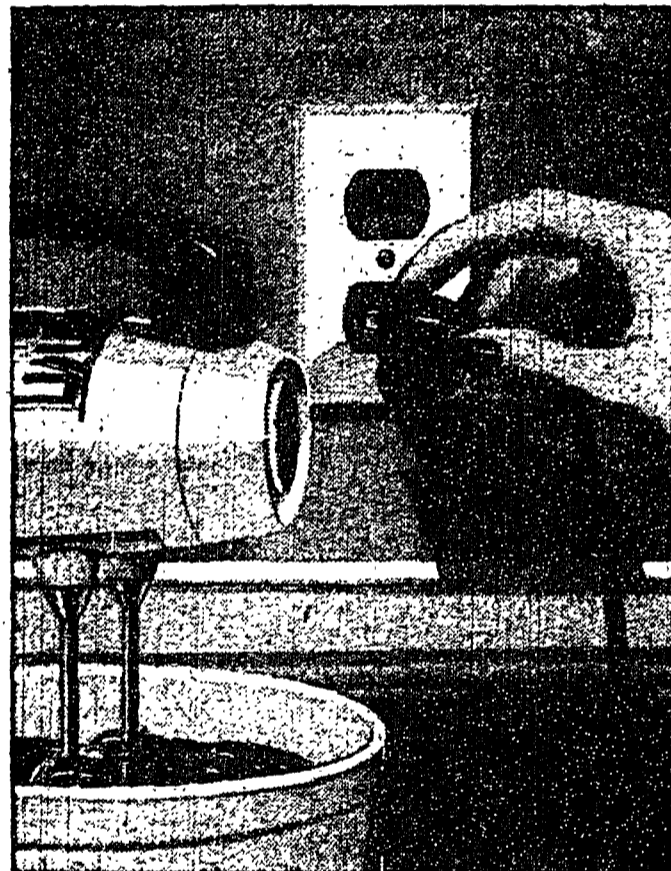
