350 ROTC Students Train in Summer

Over 350 cadets and midshipmen from the University will be completing summer training sessions in many parts of the nation and the world within the next few weeks.

CEREMONIES TO mark the end of a six-week summer camp program at Indiantown Gap Military Reservation will be held today at the post near Annville. One hundred thirty-six University cadets of the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps will participate in the exercises.

Maj. Gen. Raymond E. Bell, deputy commanding general of the Second United States Army will be the main speaker.

The Army ROTC Summer Camp in Indiantown Gap is being attended by 2,000 cadets from 46 colleges and universities. Some cadets who were unable to attend the session last summer will receive their commissions at these exercises.

The midshipmen of the University's Naval ROTC have been sent to various points for their summer training. Some have gone to Quantico, Va., Norfolk Va., Corpus Christi, Texas, and Boston, Mass.

A "graduation exercise on the beach" was held in Little Creek,

Va. yesterday for 760 midshipmen from 34 colleges and universities. In combat uniform, midshipmen ended three weeks of training when they stormed ashore at Camp Pendleton, near Little Creek.

More than 2,600 pounds of controlled demolitions, simulated offshore bombardment, underwater demolitions and a simulated atomic bomb drop added realism to the beach assault.

The landing exercise was designed to expose the midshipmen to a realistic combat situation.

The Air Force ROTC training sessions have been divided into two groups. The first left the University on June 17 and returned home on July 14. The second group left for the training sites on Saturday and will return on August 25.

THE FIRST GROUP went to Elgin Air Force Base in Florida, Lockburn Air Force Base in Ohio, Otis Air Force Base in Massachusetts, James Connally Air Force Base in Texas, Shaw Air Force Base in South Carolina and Myrtle Beach Air Force Base in South Carolina.

The second group is attending summer sessions at Elgin and Otis Air Force Bases and at Langley Air Force Base in Virginia.

Discipline Action Taken Against 9

Nine men involved in three cases of misconduct were disciplined by the Senate Subcommittee on Discipline last Thursday. Daniel R. Leasure, assistant dean of men, said yesterday.

TWO STUDENTS in business administration, one 7th and the other 8th term, were disciplined for "disorderly conduct, entertaining women in their downtown apartment and drinking alcoholic beverages as minors," Leasure said.

The infractions of University rules occurred during a party the students had in their apartment July 14. The police had been summoned to the scene at about 11 that night to investigate a complaint of a "loud and disorderly party." The twelve persons attending the party left the premises of the first floor apartment through a kitchen window before the police entered the building, Leasure said.

Two days after the incident the two students who held the party were brought before the Justice of the Peace in State College and pleaded guilty to the charge of disorderly conduct. They paid fines of \$25 each and costs of \$11.50.

The case was then referred to the University and the students were disciplined by the subcommittee. Students can be disciplined by the University and the Borough because they are responsible for their actions to both the community and the University, Leasure said.

The subcommittee placed the students on disciplinary probation until the end of the winter term 1962.

WHEN A STUDENT is placed on disciplinary probation, a notation is placed on his transcript and he is limited in his participation in student activities. A letter is also sent to the student's parents informing them of the disciplinary action.

The second case involved five students on a charge of "malicious mischief," Leasure said. Four of the men were placed on disci-

plinary probation and the fifth man on office probation until the end of this term, he said.

Those involved were two 10th term students in liberal arts, a 5th term student in the Division of Counseling, a 4th term student in home economics, and a 3rd term student in business administration.

Sometime on July 8 these men were seen kicking at a coin-changing machine in the Pollock area. One of the men had lost 50 cents in the machine and a student passing by told them if they kicked the machine, they could get some money out of it, Leasure said.

A counselor nearby came to the scene when he heard the noise and found the students in the process of picking up some of the change which had come from the machine, Leasure added.

A third case involved two 1st term students, one in elementary education and the other in business administration.

A MAINTENANCE MAN in the Pollock area caught the students tampering with an automatic washing machine in a residence hall on July 20, Leasure said.

The students were using a wire to turn the machine on without paying, Leasure said. When caught they admitted what they were attempting, he added.

The students were placed on disciplinary probation until the end of the winter term 1963.

The subcommittee handled the situation as a case of misconduct, but if such an incident occurred in the borough, it would be handled by the police as a misdemeanor, Leasure said.

THE CASE would then be heard in a civil court, Leasure said, and the persons could be fined as much as \$200 or sentenced to 6 months in jail or both.

The awards will be given at the International Night program at 7:30 tomorrow night in the HUB ballroom by William H. Gray, director of the Office of International Affairs.

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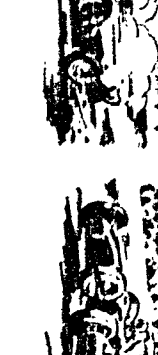
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
