Sen. Joseph S. Clark, D-Pa., will speak at 8:30 p.m. in the HUB ballroom. The public is invited and there will be no admission charge.

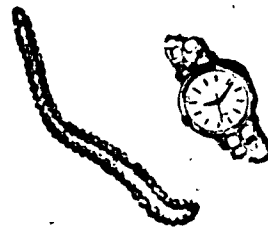

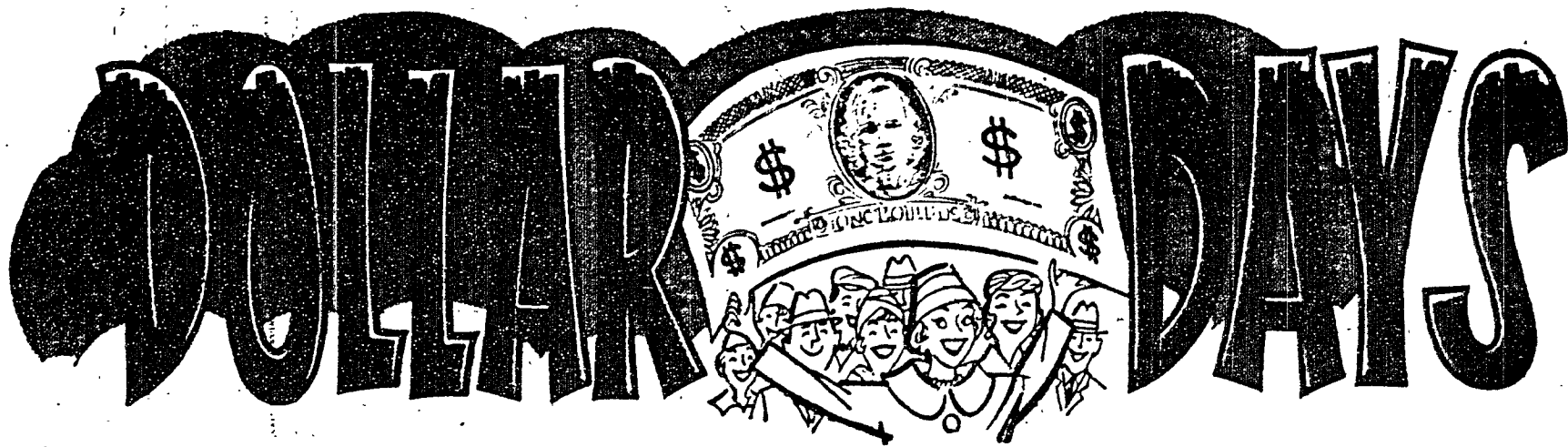
