Congress is the legislative branch of USG. All undergrad-uate students are represented on Congress through congressmen elected from the various living areas. Students elect the representatives from their areas in a ratio of one congressman for every 500 students.

The congressmen serve one-year terms. They are responsible both for informing their constituents about student government proceedings and for representing these constituents.

ANY UNDERGRADUATE student may run for a seat on Congress, providing he plans to be at the University for one consecutive school year after he is elected.

Congress meets regularly every week. The meetings are open to any student who wishes to attend. Anyone may speak from the gallery, provided he is either recognized by the chairman or a congressman yields the floor to him.
