

Argentine Institute Enters Agreement

The University and the Instituto Nacional de Tecnología Agropecuaria of Argentina have entered into an international agreement designed to promote cooperation and understanding between the United States and Argentina. The agreement covers the period from Jan. 1, 1963, to Dec. 31, 1968.

THE OBJECTIVE of the agreement is to establish a workable arrangement between the University and INTA for improving and developing deciduous fruit production in the upper valley of the Rio Negro of Argentina.

The project will include the cultivating, handling, storing, processing and marketing of apples and pears in the fertile Rio Negro Valley.

The University will be responsible for providing advice and

technical assistance necessary for the fulfillment of the objective of the program. The University, when circumstances permit, will assign members of its own staff to Argentina to collaborate and cooperate in the execution, supervision and evaluation of the projects under this program.

The University will also be responsible for the initiation and operation of training projects to acquaint INTA personnel with modern methods employed in the growing, processing and marketing of fruit.

INTA will be responsible for the practical operation of the program: provision of personnel, funds, labor, equipment and facilities. INTA will also provide financial support for the project.

The program, besides involving

the anticipated research projects, may involve the training of Argentine graduate students at the University, as well as sending graduate students from the University to Argentina in order to help in the work and obtain thesis credits.

THE TOTAL anticipated cost of the five-year program is \$1,000,000, besides necessary expenditures in Argentine currency.

Chester Hitz, professor of pomology, represented the University in initiating the agreement.
