

4 Class Gift Collections Reach Total of \$7,000

Approximately \$7,000 for future class gifts was collected during the three-day registration period in Recreation Building.

The Senior, Junior and Sophomore Class Advisory Boards collected a total of \$4,848.28 and \$310 in pledges at a table near the end of the trail at registration.

FUNDS FOR the freshmen's class gift were collected by the Sophomore Class Advisory Board. A president of the freshmen class will be elected and students selected for the Freshmen Class Advisory Board later in the term.

A class-by-class breakdown of the funds will not be available for several days, Robert Beam, Alumni Association director, said last night.

The funds have been deposited with the Alumni Fund and further tabulations will be made next week by Alumni personnel and members of the advisory boards, Beam said.

A small additional sum of money is expected to be collected this morning as special and late registrants file through Recreation Building, Beam said.

He added that the average donation per student was about \$1, and the total represented contributions from about one-third of the students.

UBA Book Sales To End Sept. 29

The UBA is operating under basically the same system as in past years with the addition of more shelving to alleviate the need for space-consuming tables, Edward Brickman, UBA chairman, said.




