

Divisions May Use Building

Eight administrative divisions of the University will occupy proposed academic services building if and when the General State Authority gives the go-ahead for its

construction. On Tuesday, GSA approved planning funds of \$138,438 for the building. University officials said they would ask GSA to include an additional \$2,215,000 grant for the structure in its next building program.

THE DIVISIONS which would occupy the academic services building include controller, admissions, registrar, housing assignment, purchasing, general services, correspondence instruc-tion and the Institute of Public Safety

Stanley H. Campbell, vice president for business administration, said yesterday that these divisions are now scattered throughout the University. He said their relocation in one building would be desirable because it would free central campus space for other services.

An academic services building priority, Campbell said, and, has been a part of the University's therefore, the fund request was 71,600 square feet of space.



Dean of Men Emphasizes Moral Dilemma of Youth

dilemma of how to stand up for their own moral standards without being regarded by their peers as "oddballs" or "petunias in an onion patch," Dean of Men Frank J. Simes said last night.

Simes, speaking in the Hetzel faculty members may be just as Union lounge, gave the first in reluctant to act, he added a series of lectures designed for freshmen. The talk, sponsored by the University Christian Associa-tion, was open to the public.

Young people do not, however, necessarily have to make a choice between leading Christian lives or being accepted by the group, Simes said. A person may both lead an exemplary life and gain acceptance so long as he does not try to influence others with his ideas, he said.

Simes felt that if an individual is aggressive about his beliefs, he is likely to be rejected by others because he arouses guilt feelings.

Moral decay is indicated today by the increase in government corruption, juvenile delinquency, illegitimate births and dope addiction, Simes said.


the reasons for morals, Simes said. They must recognize that morality is important because it affects the life of the individual and the lives of others.


