(Continued from page one) The man of the educational policy committee, spoke in opposition to the proposal.

Rayback centered his remarks on the apparent nearness and concreteness of Army and Air Force proposals which would, in

effect, make ROTC voluntary because of their selective nature if adopted.

Schanz, too, dealt with the proximity of new ROTC programs. Additionally he said that many problems would arise when students switch in or out of the

College of Liberal Arts which would have military requirements different from those in the other colleges.

At this point, Gorlow suggested, and the Senate approved without discussion, the amendment which made the liberal arts recommendation applicable to all students.

One of the most beautiful books we have seen in weeks just came in from Doubleday: Bradley Smith's, COLUMBUS IN THE NEW WORLD. The book retraces in pictures and words the four voyages of discovery, exploration, and colonization made by Columbus between 1492 and 1504. There are 250 beautiful photographs in the book, 115 of which are in full color. If you give gifts on Columbus Day, what would make a more suitable book?

Want to have fun? Remember when you were a kid and made cat's cradles with a piece of string? A new paperback has come in, which tells you in words and pictures how to make 107 different string figures. At the same time another new chess book arrived. This one by Edward Lasker, CHESS FOR FUN AND CHESS FOR BLOOD. This will be our favorite book this fall — we always liked chess for blood.

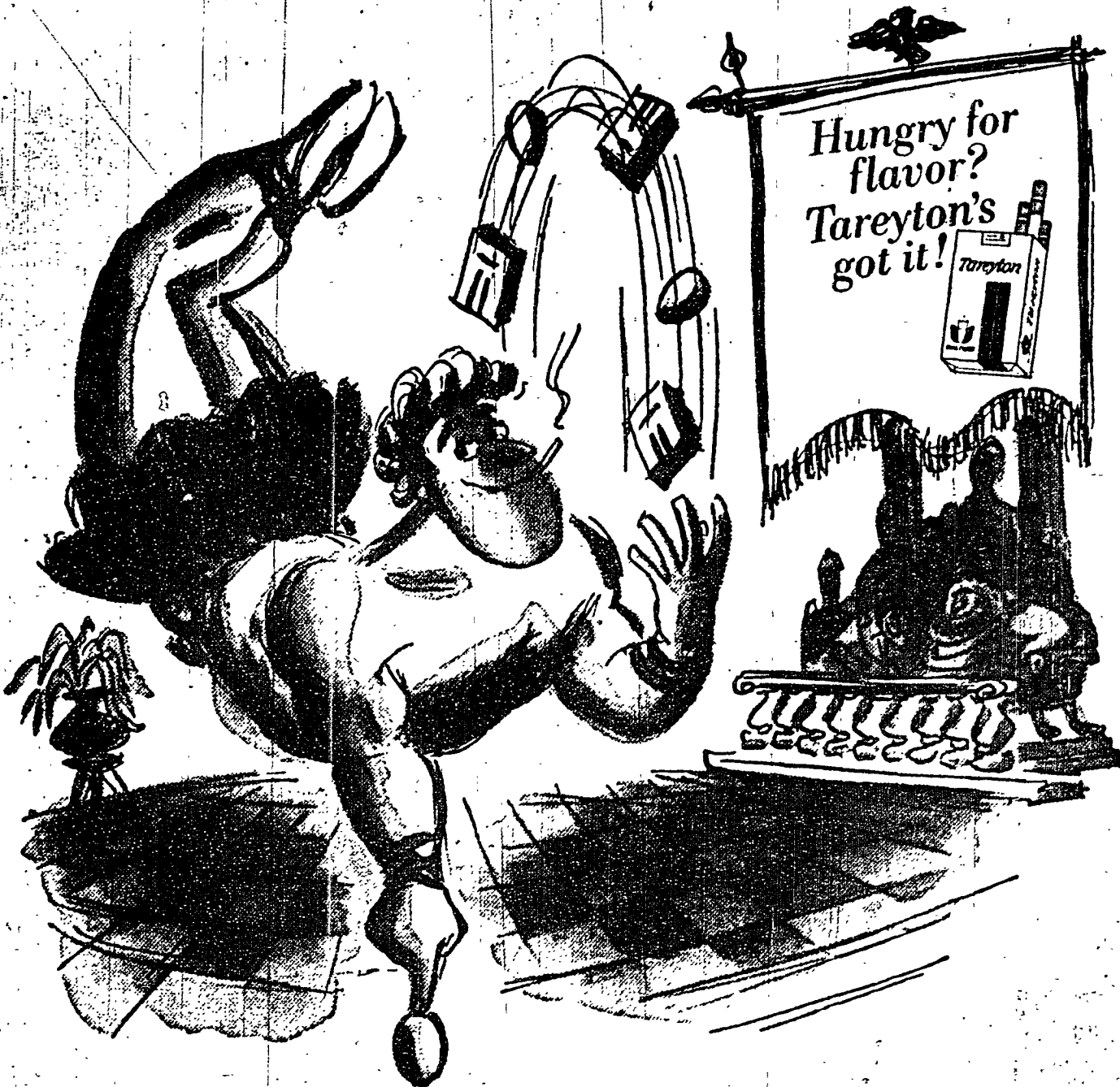
