

Absentee Balloting Explained

As the day of state elections approaches, a special situation arises for University students eligible to vote.

By being in State College, most students are away from their voting districts and, with election day falling during the academic week, many students will find it difficult to return home to vote.

To solve this problem, eligible students may apply for an absentee ballot which will enable them to vote without leaving Centre County.

ACCORDING TO the 1962 Pennsylvania Election Guide, any qualified elector of Pennsylvania, who is properly registered and enrolled and who on the day of election is unavoidably absent from the county of his voting residence by reason of his duties, business or occupation, is entitled to vote by absentee ballot.

Students may request an application for an absentee ballot by writing to the chief clerk of their county board of elections. The letter should bear the student's personal signature.

THE OFFICES of the county boards of election are located in the court houses at the county seats of each county with two exceptions. In Philadelphia, the offices are located in City Hall. In Allegheny County, they are in the County Office Building in Pittsburgh.

The chief clerk will mail the application form to the elector. The completed form must be returned to the chief clerk between Sunday and Oct. 30.

IF THE application is properly completed, the chief clerk will mail an official absentee ballot with instructions to the student. The ballot must be returned on

or before election day. Ballots postmarked later than Nov. 6 will be considered invalid.

No absentee ballot will be deemed valid if it is received by the county board of elections later than 10 a.m. Nov. 16.

New Education Building Named In Honor of First College Dean

The University's new education building, occupied for the first time this fall, has been named Chambers Building in honor of the late Will Chambers, first dean of the College of Education.

The structure, located on the former Beaver Field, is the first unit of an education-psychology center being constructed by the General State Authority.

Various administrative offices of the college and offices of the

art, elementary, industrial, music, secondary and continuing education department are located in the building. Abram W. Vandermeer is dean of the College.

Chambers, who headed the College of Education until his retirement with emeritus rank in 1937, died April 16, 1949, at his State College home at the age of 82.

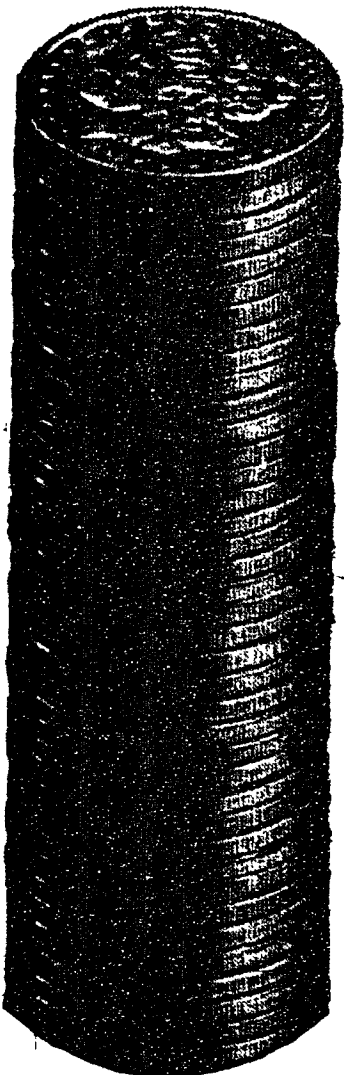
