'Hectic Pace' Called Chief Art Problem

One of the biggest problems for contemporary art is the pre-emptive life's hectic pace...

IN CONTRAST to other times, today there is no single ideal held by all men...

"What you gain from art is up to you. People like myself are forced to act as middle men as I am doing now."

Aside from the middle man, Canaday cited museums, art courses, books and general publicity as other channels that set our standards of taste in art.

"We take in art as it is dished out to us."

He titled one of the problems in art "diminishing returnism." This concept is exemplified by the artists' belief that they are making progress when they refine an idea...

"Barnett Newman's 18-inch canvas with one straight line on it does not have much to do with you and me," he said, illustrating this situation.

The other major problem, Canaday said, is that of words.

"THERE IS too much talk about art. It is good to a degree because it gives critics such as myself something to talk about. Art is a personal thing and does not need, or should not need, the popularizing it is getting."

(Continued from page one) zine's editors or directors before taking administrative action. He pointed out that in nine years as adviser to Froth, he had not received a direct complaint from either the dean of men or the dean of women.

Dean Lipp then pointed out that the chairman of the Senate Committee on Student Affairs, Lawrence H. Lattman, wrote to Froth on Oct. 6, 1961, warning that some

of the members of his committee disapproved of the kind of articles and writing present in the Froth issue of September 1961.

Pockrass countered this statement saying that, although both the dean of men and the dean of women were members of the committee, he did not consider the letter to be a direct complaint from them.

A COMPLICATION which has entered the picture is an objection to statements in the Sep-

tember issue made by six fraternities. Donovan read a note from James Burke, president of Sigma Nu, one of the fraternities involved, stating that preparatory steps have been taken to settle the issue.

Burke said last night that although the fraternities involved had gone so far as to consider a possible law suit, they are now delaying action against Froth, pending the decision of the student organization committee.
