e. e. cummings is one of our for the American language, Eng-lish instructor Charles Holt told the English Club Wednesday evening

(The late poet always spelled his name in small letters.)

HOLT SAID there has been nobody since Mark Twain who had such an absolute command of "poem" or "beauty hurts, mr. vinal" to point this up, and also to illustrate the poet's concern with sex.

In explaining cummings' un-orthodox use of syntax, (using a verb as an object of a preposition), Holt said grammar books and dictionaries don't speak. "People are the only signifi-

cant grammars and meaningful dictionaries because, at the age of five, a child has control of the language and makes it work." i Holt described cummings as three persons other than the significant minor poet whom he was:
