

Booters Visit Terps Tomorrow; Robbins in Nets; Stormer Hurt

Penn State's soccer team will unveil its third goalie in as many games tomorrow when the Nittanians meet Maryland at College Park.

Coach Ken Hosterman said yesterday that Jay Robbins would get the starting nod as State tries to shake its losing ways. The Lions have lost both previous starts. Maryland topped North Carolina State in its opener last week.

The Terps, coached by Doyle Royal, rang up a 9-1-1 slate last year, including a 5-3 triumph over State. No other team got more than four goals against the Nittanians last year. Maryland's only defeat was a 4-2 loss to NCAA champ West Chester in the Terps' final game. They were tied by Navy, 2-2.

ROBBINS JOINED the squad Monday and his impressive work in scrimmages this week earned him the starting berth. Al Shuss opened the season at goal against West Chester and Stu Ross started last week's contest with Colgate.

Injuries have again sidelined State captain Jay Stormer. His right knee heavily bandaged from an injury sustained in the Colgate game, Stormer will miss tomorrow's contest and probably the Bucknell game next Tuesday. Last year, Stormer suffered a shoulder separation in the Mary-

land game and missed the Bucknell and Navy contests. Those are the only games he has missed in his college career, though he also suffered injuries in both his freshman and sophomore years.

In his frosh campaign, Stormer had two bad ankles, while in his sophomore season he was plagued by bad knees and shin splints.

Hosterman had hoped to start Joe Hipple in Stormer's left half-back spot, but Hipple came up with a sore left ankle and he will also miss the game with the Terps. Either Ray Dacey or Lou Paulin will start in that post now.

George Berzkains has also joined the Nittanians' growing casualty list. The big center forward is limping around on a bruised instep and may not be able to play tomorrow, although he will make the trip.

Roy Johnston and Bill Manke will make their 1962 starting debuts at the fullback spots. They'll replace Ken Link and Harry Kottcamp.

Bavasi Hints at Dodger Trades

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Los Angeles Dodgers are in a trading mood, with such stars as Duke Snider and Wally Moon on the available list. But the club won't deal just to be dealing.

"I'm not going to wreck this club in a moment of anger, and I'll not dispose of our nucleus," said General Manager Buzzie Bavasi yesterday.

The Dodgers' main objective in strengthening for the 1963 season will be a second or third baseman and possibly a pitcher, Bavasi said.

In the latter case, much depends on the condition of strikeout artist Sandy Koufax and his now renowned numb finger, as Manager Walter Alston pointed out in his re-signing ceremony Wednesday.

Bavasi noted that either Snider or Moon might go—not both—because it isn't fair to the others on the team to have two such highly paid athletes riding the bench. Each reportedly earned more than \$40,000 this year.

Veterans Daryl Spencer and Andy Carey, who were merely adequate at third base, seem headed for other pastures.

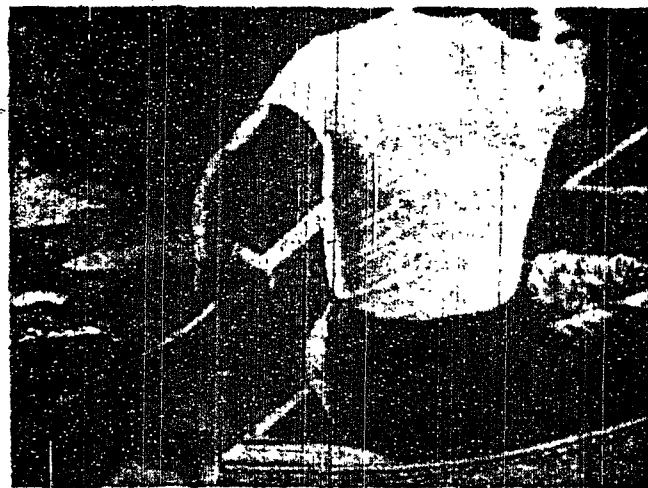

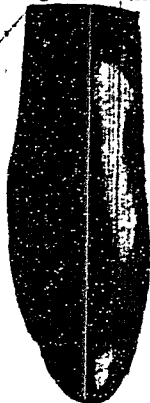

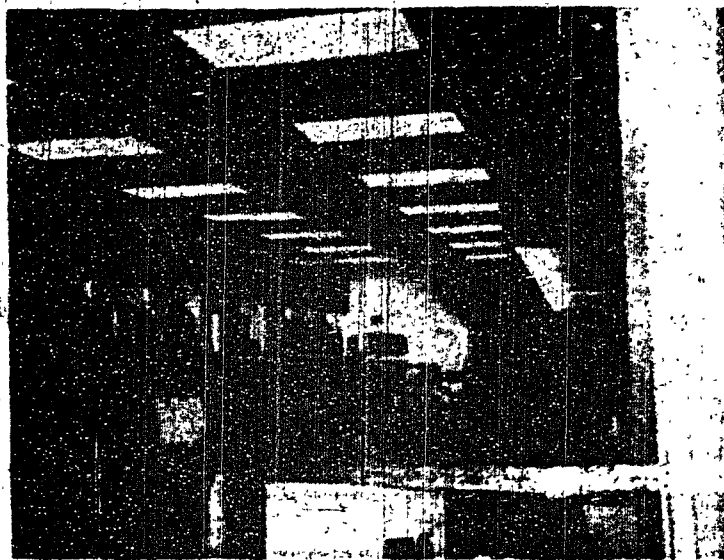
