

Lutheran Students to Hold Panel Tomorrow on Race Relationships

A forum on race relations will be presented by the Lutheran Student Association at 5:30 p.m. tomorrow at the Lutheran Student Center.

The "Ole Miss" viewpoint will be presented by Paul Foreman, professor of sociology, formerly with the University of Mississippi. Gordon Johnson (graduate-counseling-Lemont) will speak from the Negro point of view and the Rev. Arthur Seyda, Lutheran Campus Pastor, will speak on race relations and the church. The discussion is open to the public.

The Baptist Student Organization will sponsor a Folk Sing-spiration 8 p.m. tomorrow in the rehearsal room of the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel. The public is invited to participate in the folk songs and in discussion of their significance.

The Graduate Newman Club will sponsor a discussion on "Different Concepts of Faith" by the Rev. Gerard Ream, formerly campus Newman Club Chaplain, at 7:45 p.m. tomorrow in the Eisenhower Chapel Lounge.

THE NEWMAN CLUB will present the fourth discussion in their current series on "Ultimate Questions." John A. Mourant, professor of philosophy, will speak on "What Ought I to Do?" at 7 p.m. Monday in the Chapel Lounge.

The Wesley Foundation will hold their three weekly seminars tomorrow at 9:30 a.m. at the Foundation. Topics to be discussed are "Tapes of Chapel Speeches," "Noise of a Solemn

Assembly" and "Jesus Christ in Mythology." At the 10:45 a.m. service, The Rev. Richard W. Nutt will speak on "The Word Made Flesh."

Three seminars will also be held at 9:30 a.m. tomorrow by the Westminster Fellowship at the United Presbyterian Church. Topics are "Rivals to Christian Faith," "In Quest of the God Who Acts" and "Basic Christian Beliefs."

Syracuse Chaplain to Speak

Charles C. Coble, dean of Hendricks Memorial Chapel at Syracuse University, will speak on "Your Responsibility for a Fabulous Future" at the 10:55 a.m. Chapel service tomorrow in Schwab.

Director of the New York State Young Men's Christian Association, Noble is the author of "Faith for the Future," a book prepared for the YMCA centennial celebration in Canada and the United States.

AT SYRACUSE, Noble coordinates the religious programs and, as senior chaplain, speaks at the Protestant services, counsels students and aids in establishing religious policies of the university.

Born in Washington, D.C., he was graduated from Williams College in 1921 and was granted the Bachelor of Divinity degree in

1924 from Union Theology Seminary. He was ordained in the Methodist Church in 1923 and has since held pastorates in New York and Connecticut. He assumed his present post in 1945.

Willa C. Taylor will direct the Chapel Choir in Howard Hansen's "Psalm 8."

LEONARD RAVER, Chapel organist, will play Toccata by Claudio Merulo, Fantasy on "The Third Tune" by Martin and Geoffrey Shaw, "Partita on Jesu, Meine Freunde" by Johann G. Walther and Toccata from Sym-

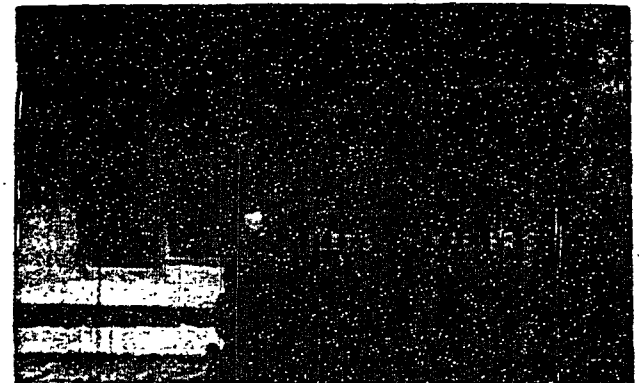
