

Wooster to Host Conference For Discussion of U.S. Policy

An intercollegiate conference to stimulate discussion on United States foreign policy and the Communist challenge will be held Nov. 16 and 17 at the College of Wooster, Wooster, Ohio.

Penn State students have been invited to participate in the program, which is sponsored by the Student Senate and the Institute of Politics of Wooster. Vernon V. Aspaturian, professor of political science, will speak at the conference.

Other speakers and resource personnel will include Andrew W. Cordier, author and dean of the School of International Affairs at Columbia University. Cordier was executive assistant to the United

Nations Secretary-General from 1946 to 1961 and served as special U.N. representative to Korea and the Congo.

Arthur Larson, director of the World Rule of Law Center of Duke University and former special consultant to President Dwight Eisenhower, will also speak as will Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Discussion seminars will consider emerging nations, international organizations, military policy and coexistence.

USG to Hear New Insurance Plan

Details of a possible student life insurance plan at the University will be presented to the newly elected Undergraduate Student Government Congress when it meets for the first time tomorrow night, Dean Wharton, USG president, said yesterday.

The Congress, Wharton said, will not be asked to decide on the

merits of the plan or on its endorsement tomorrow.

Earlier in the month, Wharton formed a three-member committee to study the possibilities offered by a plan underwritten by the Life Insurance Co. of Pennsylvania. Wharton, Arthur Williams, professor of insurance, and Duane Junker, president of the Insurance Club, are the committee members.

WHARTON said that he plans to present the Congress with the details of the proposed plan and the pros and cons concerning it as the committee sees them.

The Congress will have to decide whether to endorse the plan, he said, and will also need to

consider the larger issue of a general policy on endorsements by USG.

The policy under discussion with representatives of University Life Plans, Inc., calls for \$10,000 of term insurance for students aged 16 to 23. The student pays \$20 per year for this coverage and has the option, before age 24, of converting the policy to a permanent one.

USG CURRENTLY endorses a sickness and accident policy for students and their dependents. This plan was designed especially for Penn State, while the life insurance plan now under consideration was not, Wharton said.
