

# Suspension Penalty Given to 5 Students

Five students were suspended and two placed on disciplinary probation recently by the Senate Subcommittee on Discipline, Daniel R. Leasure, assistant dean of men, said yesterday.

A 5th term student in the College of Home Economics and a 5th term student in the Division of Counseling were suspended for attempting to steal a mattress from a residence hall, Leasure said. The students had intended to use the mattress in a town apartment, he added.

The home economics student was suspended until the end of the spring term 1963, while the Division of Counseling student was suspended until the end of the winter term 1963, Leasure said.

The home economics student's penalty was more severe, Leasure said, because he was on disciplinary probation at the time of the incident.

**IN OTHER ACTION**, the subcommittee suspended a 10th term engineering student and a 4th term mineral industries student until the end of the fall term 1962.

Leasure said the students admitted having two coeds in their apartment who were found to be missing from their residence hall after sign-in time.

Also suspended until the end of the fall term 1962 was a 7th term liberal arts student, he said.

The student was apprehended by a local store manager for shoplifting after picking up a bottle of liquid make-up. The student intended to use the make-up for a Halloween party, Leasure explained.

**A FOURTH term** business administration student was placed on disciplinary probation until the end of the winter term 1963 for drinking in a residence hall and creating a disturbance, he said.

Also placed on disciplinary probation, until the end of the fall term 1962, was a 1st term business administration student, Leasure said.

The student, who had in his possession an alcoholic beverage, was apprehended by a residence hall counselor as he left a dance held in a University building, he added.

# Choir to Tour 7 Countries

The approximately 70 members of the Chapel Choirs who are going on the European tour this summer will visit seven countries, Willa Taylor, director of the Chapel Choirs, said yesterday.

Tentative plans have been made to tour England; Amsterdam, the Netherlands; Cologne, Germany; Geneva and Riffleberg, Switzerland; Florence and Venice, Italy; Salzburg, Austria; and Paris, France.

**THE GROUP** will present 14 concerts while on tour. The program for the concerts has not yet been selected, but the music will all be sacred and will emphasize the works of 20th century American composers. The performances will either be free or the admission fee will be presented to a local charity, Mrs. Taylor said.

The students will also attend concerts at the Holland Music Festival in Amsterdam and at the Salzburg Festival in Salzburg.

The students making the six-week tour must pay all their expenses, which will be approximately \$1,000, Mrs. Taylor said. Any of the 350 members of the Chapel Choirs who feels that he can afford to go may request to audition for the trip.

At present, 70 people have been accepted for the trip, which is almost fully subscribed. However,

these students are still free to drop out of the program.

The tour has two aims, Mrs. Taylor said. The first is musical. "We want the students to learn a concert program and learn how to present it publicly as well as can be done," she said.

The second aim is educational. In an attempt to acquaint the students with conditions abroad, Mrs. Taylor said that every effort will be made to bring the group into contact with people from the European countries.
