

# Lyons Two Tops Nittany 36-37

The fine-all-around performances of quarterback Nick Reynolds paced the Lyons II football squad to a spine-tingling overtime victory over Nittany 36-37 in independent playoff action last evening on the golf course gridiron.

Reynolds directed the Lyons II outfit to their only score in the first period, climaxing a long drive by firing an eight-yard aerial to Rick Kondan for the touchdown. Reynolds booted the extra point, making the score 7-0.

On the first play in the second half, Nittany 36-37, came back as Jim Britton heaved a 51-yard bomb to George Ely for the score. Ely's conversion knotted the count at 7-7.

**THE TEAMS** battled on even terms after that, and at the end of regulation time the squads were tied not only in score, but also in first downs, 3-3.

The contest then went into an overtime period, and after the Nittany griders failed to move the ball, Lyons II took over.

After two plays failed, a Reynolds pass put the pigskin within inches of a first down. On fourth down, Miles Benickes took a Reynolds pass over the stripe for the first down and the victory.

The brilliant passing of Jim Ramage featured the Rats' lopsided 33-0 win over Juniper.

Ramage fired five touchdown aerials in the game, including a pair to Roy Brubaker. The pint-sized Rat tailback also threw scoring passes to Lou Wheeler, King Strong and Angelo Palocetti as the Rats completely dominated the game.

A safety late in the second half gave Nittany 27-28 a tight, 9-7 decision over Balsam.

**THE BALSAM** outfit drew first blood when Joe Melville and Joe Pallischek teamed up for a 45-yard pass play early in the game. The play put the ball on the one-yard line and on the next

play, Melville hit Pallischek again for the touchdown. Walt Miller's PAT made it 7-0.

Balsam then kicked off, and just three plays later Nittany 27-28's Dave Leib took a 39-yard pass from Jim Lewis and scampered to pay dirt. John Harvey booted the tying point.

In the closing moments of the contest, Harvey proved to be the hero as he stopped a Balsam ball carrier behind the goal for the game-winning safety.

A high-spirited, well-organized Venango outfit whipped Birch on the strength of quarterback Gary Erlbaum's three touchdown passes.

Erlbaum's touchdown targets were Tom Florckiewicz, Gene Ott and Ralph "Pumpkin" Hoover.

Glenn McCauslin also starred for Venango, as he was outstanding on pass defense and as an offensive receiver.

The Bad Guys whitewashed Columbia 13-0 as Frank Davis led the attack.

**DAVIS PICKED** off a Columbia pass and raced 27 yards to a touchdown early in the second half after a scoreless opening half.

The Bad Guys insured their 6-0 advantage a short while later when Davis fired a scoring pass to Bill Firing.

An early touchdown was enough to enable Lackawanna to edge Lawrence, 7-0, in a tight defensive contest.

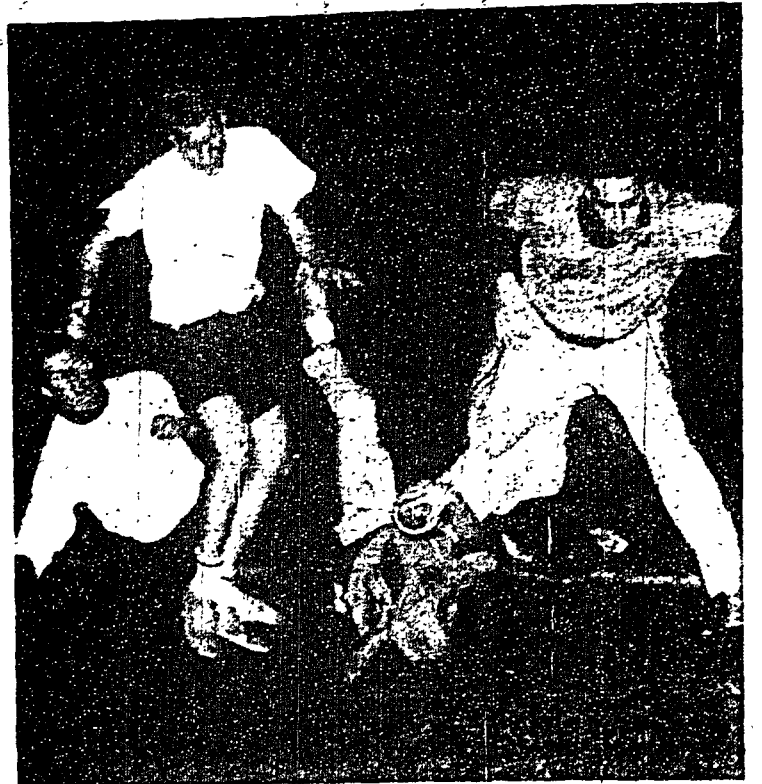
John Kelco threw a 43-yard scoring bomb to Larry Bell for the Lackawanna tally midway in the first half. Fred Owen kicked the conversion.

Another defensive game showed Clearfield shading the Sportsmen 4-1 on first downs. The tilt was marked by outstanding team efforts on the part of both squads.

The playoffs will continue tonight as last evening's victors will clash in a quartet of games on the golf course field.
