

Ag Students Choose Annual Party Theme

"Way back when..." will be the theme of the 13th annual Ag Hill party, which will be held at 5:30 p.m. Saturday at Recreation Building.

Relics from the early history of Ag Hill will help carry out the theme. Costumes and decorations will illustrate the 100 years of agricultural progress since the signing of the Morrill Act in 1862. This act created the land-grant universities.

A major attraction of the evening will be the selection of Miss Agriculture of 1962 and the four members of her court. Semi-finalists were selected this weekend and will be announced at the party by Ellen Allbeck (10th agricultural journalism-Millville), current Miss Agriculture and chairman of the selection committee.

CONTESTANTS for this award are nominated by agricultural clubs. All nominees must be students in the College of Agriculture.

Research Review

Study Compares Early Dating Habits

Early dating is far more common in suburban than in rural or urban areas because suburban parents are more permissive than those in other areas, Carl Fred Broderick, associate professor of family relationships, said recently.

Broderick's findings are the partial results of a "cross-sex attitude" research project being conducted at the University.

"MANY PARENTS appear to operate under the mistaken theory that sex starts at puberty. They assume that early kissing is meaningless. But pre-teen dating starts the youngster on the road to progressive intimacy. By the time these children have reached their

teens, they have pretty well covered the field and are ready for nothing less than marriage," Broderick said.

Data gathered in his recent research, financed by a \$25,000 grant from the National Institutes of Health, indicates that 30 per cent of suburban sixth grade pupils "go steady" or have "gone steady," he said. Only 9 per cent of rural children at this grade level claimed to have gone steady, he said.

By the tenth grade, he said, the rural boys and girls have caught up with their suburban contemporaries.

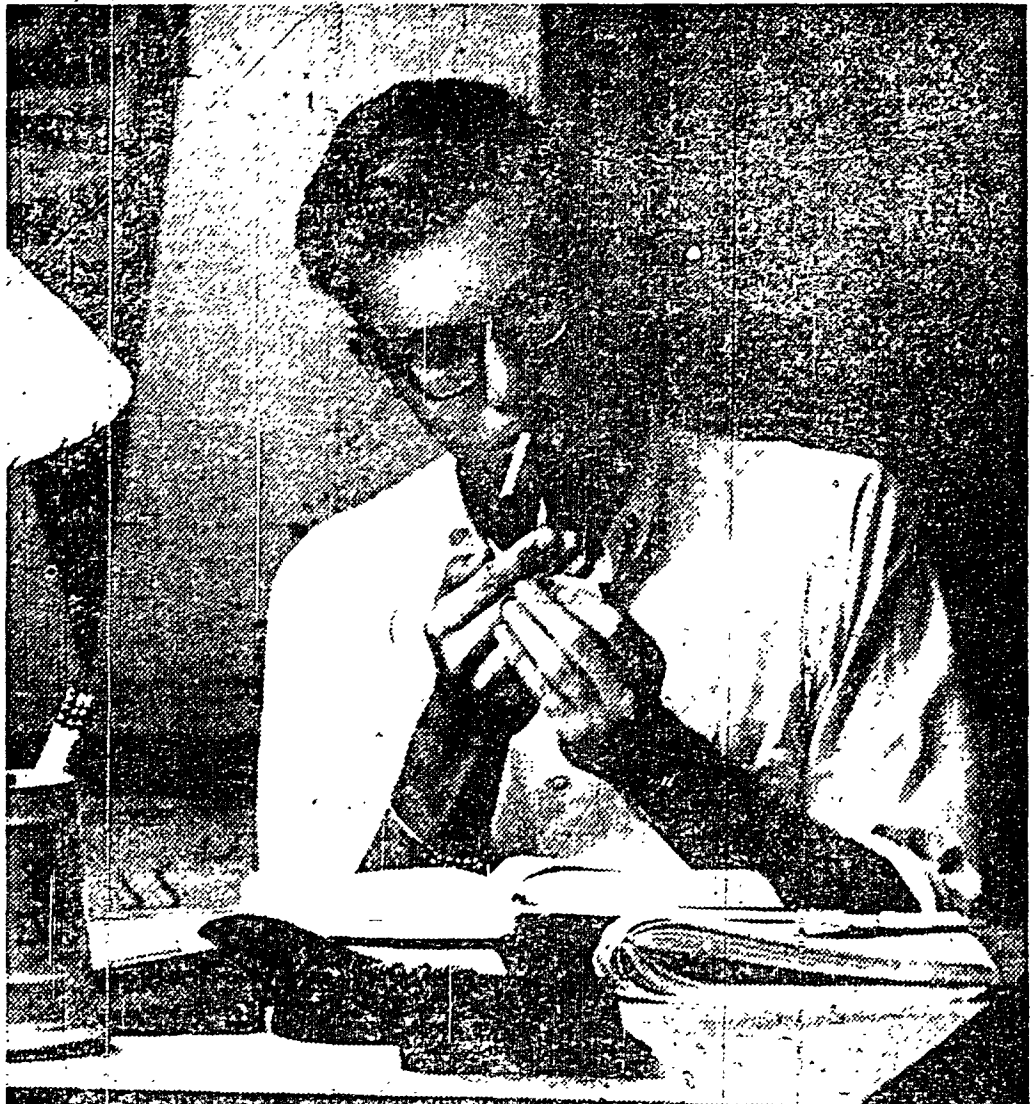
PRIOR TO his present study, Broderick did pilot studies in a small Georgia town in which he studied a total of 264 students

from the fifth, sixth and seventh grades. The students ranged in age from 9 to 14 and came from upper-lower to upper-middle class homes.

All of those children studied attended the same school. Most of the fifth graders were 10 or 11, the sixth graders 11 or 12 and the seventh graders 12 or 13 years old.

Broderick's preliminary studies show that about 52 per cent of the fifth graders in his study had close friends of the opposite sex.

BRODERICK'S pilot studies are now serving as a basis for the current research. His recent survey encompassed 4,000 children from the second through the twelfth grade in rural, urban and suburban areas.
