

Quintin Views Attitudes Of Today's French Youth

The French youth of today are characterized by an indifference to traditional morals and a great interest in government issues, Yvan Quintin, instructor of French, said Wednesday evening.

Quintin, speaking to the French Club and French House on "French Youth Today," said the attitude of the young people toward the morals of their parents is reasonable, not antagonistic. Rather than listen to older people, the French youth think for themselves and avoid being tied down by traditional morals, he said.

French young people like to observe many kinds of beliefs and ideas, Quintin said, but until recently a young person wouldn't dare carry on a conversation with someone who had different beliefs. Now conversations between two young people with different ideals, such as a Catholic and a Communist, are more common, he said.

THE STRICT rules for courtship and marriage have also been rejected by today's French youth, Quintin said. Formerly, a boy and girl from two different social levels would not marry, but now intellectual rapport is the most important factor influencing marriage decisions, he said.

A new attitude toward religion is also characteristic of French

youth today, Quintin said. Many young people have rediscovered the religions of their parents and grandparents, who are mostly Roman Catholic, he said. Unlike their parents and grandparents, however, they live and feel their religion, he said.

IN THEIR attitude toward politics, French youth differ from American youth in that they are completely for or against an issue, Quintin said. They participate actively in political life, continually thinking of what France will be like in 30 years, he said.

The French youth also differ from American youth in their roles as students, Quintin said. College students in France have complete independence and organize their lives as they please, he said.

A French college student would never stand for restrictions like those of this University, he said.

A native of Brest, Brittany, France, Quintin has studied Latin, Greek and French at the Sorbonne.

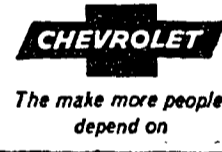
