

Conflict Exams Set

Farm Trend

Grain Fields Converted by Automation

Automation on the farm has begun a trend to convert land from grain to grass production, Herbert Albrecht, president of North Dakota State University, said yesterday.

This trend is particularly evident in North Dakota where grain surpluses are becoming an increasing problem. Research and extension work at the North Dakota State University will help in making this conversion smooth, he said.

ALBRECHT, former director of agricultural extension work at Penn State, returned to campus for a few days yesterday.

Unlike Pennsylvania which has unemployment problems due to automation in industry, North

Dakota's unemployment problems stem from automation on the farms, he explained.

He said the opportunities are more restricted in North Dakota than in Pennsylvania for moving surplus labor from farm to industry.

The change from grain production which is in surplus now to grassland which can be used for raising livestock will provide a more stable influence on the economy, Albrecht said.

Such production will not be as susceptible to ruin by changes in the weather, he added.

North Dakota State University's extension service will play a prominent role in advising and instructing farmers about how to make the change in production, he explained.

About one-third of the efforts of this university is concentrated in agricultural research work. This particular extension work is intended to help the overall economy of the state, he added.

In curriculum offerings, Penn State as well as North Dakota is gearing its agricultural programs towards training the student to go into the business aspects of agriculture rather than back to the farm, he said.

FOR EXAMPLE, graduates are now turning to agricultural education work, food processing and marketing, Albrecht said. Sales and service of farm machinery and implements, farm chemical research and work with federal government in agriculture are also becoming popular vocational choices.
