

Cowards Battle Pitt In Blood Bowl Game

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 23—The Cowards worked out under the lights at Forbes Field tonight amidst rumors of possible dissension among the Pitt News staff.

The two unbeaten powers will meet tomorrow morning at 10 in the 5th annual Blood Bowl for the championship of the Eastern Conference Writers.

Rumors spread like wildfire throughout Pittsburgh today that Pitt's star fullback, Bob "Sage" Smizik, is dissatisfied and that, after the Hawks' last game against the Mt. Mercy School of Nursing, he was reported to have had an argument with quarterback and head coach Jim "I Like Mike" O'Brien.

Smizik is reported to have told O'Brien "I made two mistakes in my life—one joining the Pitt News and staying here."

ELLIOT "MUMBLES" Drexler is also reported to be at-odds with O'Brien. One Pittsburgh paper reported that Drexler told O'Brien "We ought to get rid of the entire coaching staff and hire the ones now employed at Mt. Mercy."

Coward coach Joel "Weather-vane" Myers refused to make any predictions after tonight's workout. He told reporters, "We'll show up!"

Myers said he will go with the same starting lineup that has carried the Cowards to an unbeaten season.

Dean "Cannonball" Billick and Ken "How Dry I Am" Denlinger will start at end; Ira "Bigger Than Big Daddy" Miller and Dave "Bigger Than Ira Miller" Runkel at tackle; Jim "Garbage Mouth" Bukata and Den "Darkroom" Coleman at guard and Jack "Crusher" Borgerding at center.

STARTING IN the backfield will be Phil "Slingshot" Guest at quarterback, Jim "Lead Feet" Karl and Joe "B.O." Grata at halfback and Frank "Killer" Quigley at fullback.

Missing from the Cowards' lineup due to injuries will be Dave "Quickest Hands in the East" Bolbach, Herb "High Ads" Witmer and John "Tonsils" Morris.

Bolbach suffered a fractured hand last Saturday night at a fraternity party while Witmer is still recovering from an operation for a ruptured hangnail.

Morris' loss could be the biggest break the Cowards have had. He was slated to start at quarterback.

When oddsmakers in Pittsburgh learned of his injury the odds on the Cowards dropped from 24 to 1 point favorites.

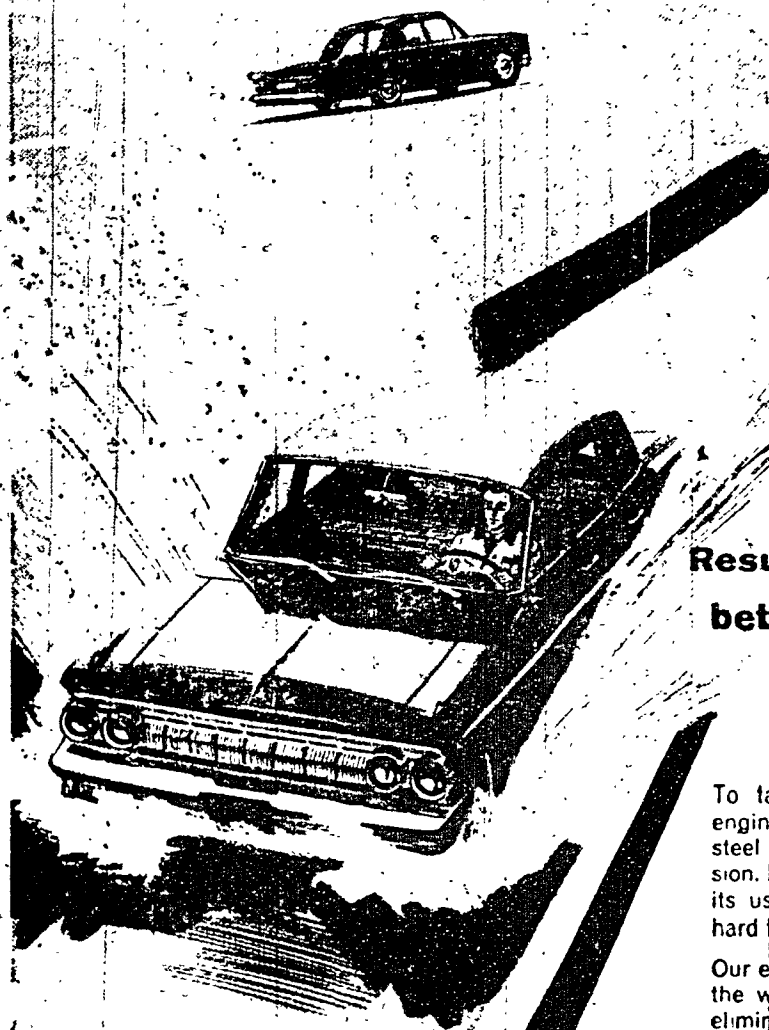
