

Drew University Prof To Speak At Service Tomorrow in Schwab

H. Gordon Harland, associate professor of church history at Drew University School of Theology, will speak on "The Emancipation Proclamation" at Chapel at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab. Born in Canada, Harland was graduated with a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Manitoba in 1942, and was granted the bachelor of divinity degree by the Theological School of United Colleges, Winnipeg, in 1945, and the doctor of philosophy degree by Drew University in 1959. He was ordained to the ministry of the United Church of Canada in 1945. From 1945 to 1955, Harland was a member of the faculty of theology at United College.

Among his writings is "The Thought of Reinhold Niebuhr," published by Oxford University Press in 1960.

The Chapel Choir will sing the William Byrd anthem, "O quam suavis." Leonard Raver, Chapel organist, will play music by composers from Boston, Mass., including the prelude, "Quiet Music for Organ," by Gardner Read; the offertory, "Benedicta Tu," by Everett Titcomb; and the postlude, "Toccata," by Daniel Pinkham.

The Rev. P. Barrett Rudd, acting director of the University Christian Association, will conduct the service, aided by David Wilson, president of the Chapel Choir.

Epiphany Service Scheduled

A midnight Epiphany Service with music by the Chapel Choir will be held at 10:40 tonight in Schwab.

This program replaces the Chapel Candlelight Service usually held in early December.

The choir, directed by Mrs. Willa Taylor, will sing Gabrieli's "In ecclesiis, from Book II of the 'Symphonia Sacra,' with organ and brass ensemble; "O quam suavis," by William Byrd; "Hosanna to the Son of David," by Thomas Weelkes; "O Lord, the maker of all things," by John Joubert and "Sinfonia Sacra" by Daniel Pinkham, with organ and brass quartet.

Leonard Raver, Chapel organist, will combine with Mrs. Overda Page, flute, and Raymond Page, violinist, to present the pre-

lude concert. Included will be "Noel in G" by Louis Claude Daquin; "Sonata in F" for flute and organ by George Philip Telemann; "Chorale Prelude and Fugue on 'Von Himmel Hoch'" by Johann Pachelbel; and "Poem" for viola and organ by Leo Sowerby.

The Rev. P. Barrett Rudd, acting director of the University Christian Association, will conduct the service, aided by Kenneth Hershberger, vice president of the Men's Residence Council.
