

# Starker and Sebok To Open Series

Janos Starker, cellist, and Gyorgy Sebok, pianist, will present a sonata recital at 8:30 p.m. Saturday in Schwab as the first presentation of the term of the University Artists Series.

Student ticket distribution will begin at 1:30 p.m. today and continue until 5 p.m. at the Hetzel Union desk. Tickets may also be obtained from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. tomorrow and Friday.

GENERAL ADMISSION tickets for non-students will go on sale beginning tomorrow for \$1.50 each.

With the term's first concert, the Artists Series Committee will begin a new ticket collection policy. Students will have to present matriculation cards as well as series tickets for admission.

The policy was adopted at the end of last term as a result of the discovery that non-students were using student tickets for admission, Nina Brown, administrative assistant for the series, said yesterday.

The action had been specifically recommended to the committee by the Undergraduate Student Government Congress, which adopted a resolution urging the new policy last term.

The two musicians will play Johann Sebastian Bach's Sonata No. 2 in D major, Sonata in C major, Opus 119 by Sergey Pro-

kofiev and Sonata in D major, Opus 58 by Felix Mendelssohn.

THEY WILL also play seven variations on "Bei Maennern, welche Liebe fuehlen" from Mozart's "The Magic Flute." This music was arranged by Ludwig van Beethoven.

Sebok is a Hungarian who is on tour in North America for the first time. He has been a professor at the Conservatory of Budapest since 1947 and in 1951 won the first prize of the International Berlin Competition and the Liszt Prize given by the Hungarian State. Both prizes were for his musical ability.

Also a native Hungarian, Starker became internationally known

for his European concerts in 1946. In 1948 he came to the United States to live and work, and was described by Time magazine as the "cloudborne cellist."

HE HAS OCCUPIED the first cello chair of several leading orchestras and in 1957 appeared at the Hollywood Bowl. Reviewing this performance, the Los Angeles Herald and Express called him "one of the few ranking cellists of the day."

Paul Henry Lang of the New York Herald Tribune lauded Starker after a 1960 performance calling him a "superlative cellist, equipped with an abundance of technique and a magnificent tone. An artistic event of the first magnitude."

## New Mail Regulations Put Into Effect To Aid Quicker Delivery Service

The revised regulations for incoming student mail which students received in their registration envelopes have been put into effect to get mail to students as quickly as possible, Wilbur F. Diehl, supervisor of mail and telephone service, said yesterday.

Diehl said many letters are being incorrectly addressed to students in care of the Pennsylvania State University when they are living off-campus. The letters should be addressed to State College. By dropping the name, of

the University from all student addresses, it is hoped this mistake will be eliminated, Diehl said.

He said that in a typical five-day week, there are 21,000 pieces of student and faculty mail of all types, except parcel post that are either insufficiently or incorrectly addressed. This mail has to be directorized and sent to the correct address.

With the revised regulations, Diehl said, the post office will be able to give better service in getting the mail to the students.
