

MSU Offers Study Abroad Plan

College and University students have been invited to participate in a new language study program offered in Europe by Michigan State University during the summer of 1963.

Six-week intensive courses in French at Lausanne, Switzerland; in German at Cologne, Germany; in Italian at Florence, Italy, and in Spanish at Madrid, Spain are now open to students with some background in the language they wish to study.

A fee of about \$500 intitles the student to round-trip transportation, tuition for the six-week course and room and board with European families while participating in the program.

A period of about 15 days following completion of the course is allowed for travel at the student's discretion. These travel costs are not covered by the \$500, however.

Chartered planes will leave New York for Europe during the second week in July. Courses begin on Monday, July 15. The return flights leave Europe the second week in September.

Open Bidding To Begin Today

Rushes and sorority women must maintain strict silence after a bid has been extended, Mrs. Vanderpool said.

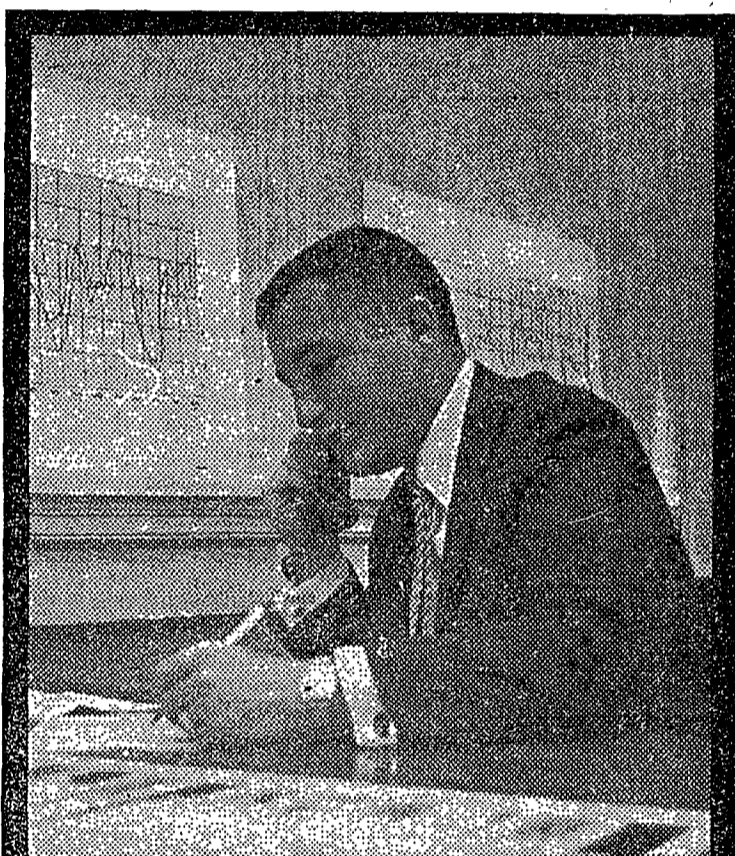
