Senior Tom Seward, the Lions' outstanding all-around competitor, set the pace with a quota of three first placesin free exercise, on the parallel bars and on the high bar.

Six players were in double figures with Carver Clinton, Ray Saunders and Jim Reed leading the way.

CLINTON LED both teams with 24 points while Reed and Saunders each tallied 20. Jerry Roseboro with 13 points and Ed Schiff and Tony Neumayr with 12 and 11 points respectively were the other freshmen in double figures.
