

Musicologist To Lecture

Denis W. Stevens, a distinguished visiting professor in the music department, will begin a series of music lectures at 8 p.m. tomorrow in 209 Home Ec South. He will discuss the different combinations of instruments and voices which were used in the music of the Renaissance. Since art and literature give many hints as to the way the musical groups of this period were organized, Stevens said he will use tapes and slides to illustrate the lecture. Stevens not only conducts and performs, but also writes books

about music. He attended Jesus College in England and studied privately in Paris. For several years he was a music critic for the Oxford Times and then he became a violinist with the Philharmonic Orchestra of London. He also worked with the British Broadcasting Corp. Before coming to the University, Stevens was a professor at the Royal Academy of Music in London, Cornell, Columbia and McGill. He is also the conductor and founder of the Ambrosian singers, a professional group.
