

Model U.N. Secretariat Issues Texts of 5 Draft Resolutions

As the Friday opening of the Model United Nations Assembly nears, the Secretariat Monday released the texts of five draft resolutions which will be considered by that body in full and committee sessions.

COPIES OF the resolutions are available at the Hetzel Union desk for delegates to the Model U.N. More than ten resolutions were submitted last night. Texts of these resolutions will be released as they are printed.

One resolution, which the Committee on Nuclear Testing will debate, condemns all nuclear and

thermonuclear tests. The resolution also asks that tests be ended immediately.

Sponsored by 12 nations, including India, the Republic of China and the Philippines, the resolution also calls on all the nuclear powers to agree on a test detection system. Establishment of a verification system by an expert committee of the nuclear powers is also requested in the resolution.

Czechoslovakia and Italy have each submitted resolutions dealing with the reorganization of the Secretariat, which is the administrative arm of the world body.

The Czechoslovakians ask elim-

ination of permanent positions in the Secretariat, "by the greatest number possible," because there is now "an inequitable distribution of positions at the 'senior level of operations' and especially in relation to the lack of representation apportioned among nations of the United Nations admitted since the ratification of the charter."

They state that 75 per cent of the "permanent positions" in the Secretariat are currently held by United States nationals or the nationals of other Western countries.

The Czechoslovakians propose that positions with a term of five years be used to replace the "permanent positions."

THE ITALIAN resolution notes that the geographical distribution of positions in the Secretariat leaves certain areas under-represented. They ask that these areas, principally Eastern Europe and the newly independent states of Africa, be specially regarded in filling vacancies as they occur.

The United Nations charter, in articles 100 and 101, states that Secretariat appointments are to be made on a merit basis, with due consideration being paid to the principle of geographical distribution.

A recent report by a special expert committee of the Secretariat notes that Communist bloc states as well as many of the underdeveloped or newly emergent states are not equitably represented according to this principle.

A portion of the troupe's yearly schedule is devoted to touring the

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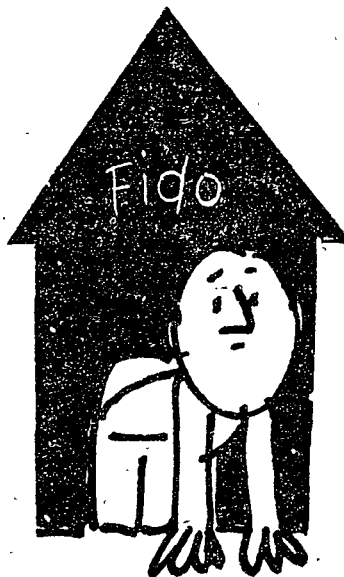
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
