

Matmen To Combat Layoff With Intrasquad Tourney

Penn State wrestling coach Charlie Speidel has decided that the best way to keep his inactive team in shape is to hold an intrasquad wrestling tournament.

The tourney will get underway today and will match members of the freshman and varsity teams in single elimination bouts.

Opening round matches today will pit Denny Slattery against Hugh Paxton and Willy Ebaugh against Tom Balent at 123 pounds; Bob Haney against Dave Savage and Bill Whittaker against Ray Nunamaker at 130 pounds, and Dick Campbell against Roy Rose, Glenn Thiel against Mark Piven and Joe Kolich against Dave Thiel at 137 pounds.

Other bouts scheduled for the tournament have George Edwards meeting Dick DeWalt and Sandy Gellis facing Mike Beck at 147 and Mitch Hall wrestling Art Weiss and John Bienu meeting Chuck Beatty at 157 pounds.

In the 167-pound class, Matt Dunne will tangle with Marty Strayer, with the winner meeting either Bob Zeigler or John Zabatta.

Mike Gill and Ed Fleming will wrestle for the 177-pound title and Don McKeena will wrestle Dick Walker while Ed Pohland faces Fred Euteromoser in heavy-weight bouts.

Syracuse, Holy Cross, Rice and Florida each placed two players on Penn State's all-opponent football team for 1962.

Syracuse players named were end Walt Sweeney and guard Dave Meggyesy.

Halfback Al Snyder and center Jon Morris represent Holy Cross, while Rice placed end Gene Raesz and tackle Larry Stewart.

Florida, a 17-7 Gator Bowl winner over the Lions, was represented by tackle Frank Lasky and halfback Larry Dupree.

California's Craig Morton, the sophomore sensation who completed 20 of 28 passes for 274 yards and three touchdowns in a losing cause against State, was a near unanimous choice at quarterback.

Rounding out the team are Pitt fullback Rick Leeson and West Virginia guard Keith Melenzyer.

There were no unanimous selections, although Morton, Morris, Meggyesy, Leeson and Dupree won by large margins.

Cincinnati Again Tops Cage Poll

The unbeaten Cincinnati Bearcats hurdled one of their biggest obstacles by whipping Illinois last Saturday night and thus kept a tight grip on their No. 1 college basketball rating.

In winning their 15th game of the season and their 33rd in a row, the twice national champions gained 42 of the 43 first place votes from The Associated Press panel of sports writers and broadcasters.

Loyola of Chicago, with a record of 18 victories and no defeats, held second place and Duke was third. The Blue Devils moved up

after smothering West Virginia, 111-71.

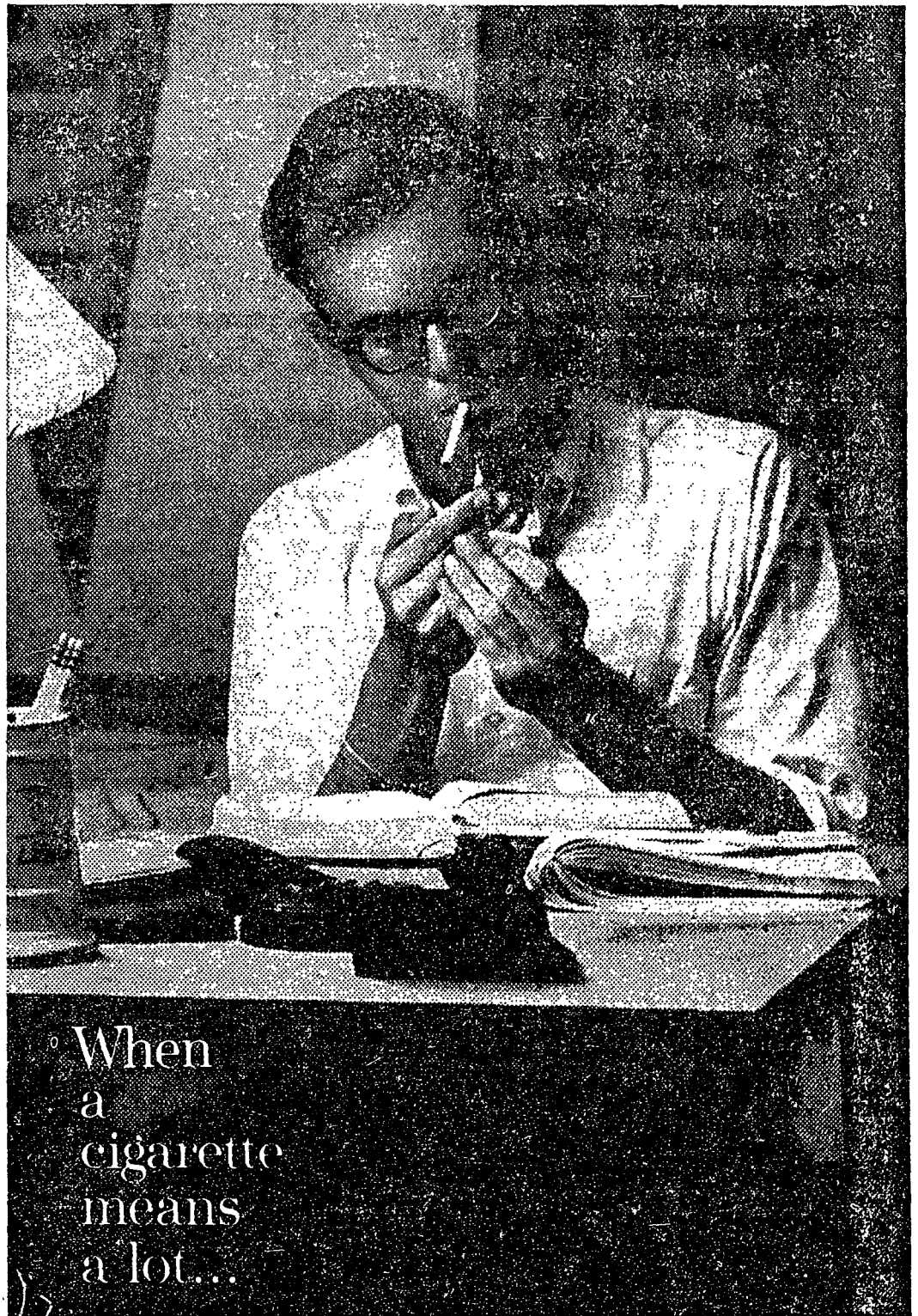

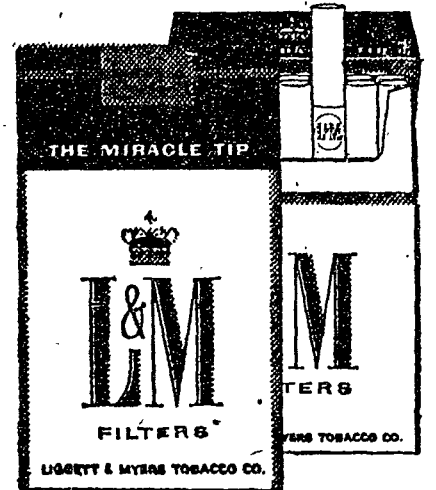
