## Canadian Problem

# U.S. Acts Indelicately—Albinski

The dispute between the United States and Canada which brought the downfall of the Conservative government of John C. Diefenbaker Tuesday night has been magnified out of proportion because of the indelicacy with which the U.S. acted, Henry S. Albinski, assistant professor of political science, said yesterday.

A U.S. State Department paper last week criticized Canada for its delay in accepting American nuclear weapons as part of the U.S.-Canadian defense of North America.

According to a report of the Associated Press, Canada agreed in 1959 to accept American nuclear weapons.

DEAN RUSK, secretary of state, said that the statement was released because of remarks in a heated parliamentary debate in Ottawa which disclosed confidential exchanges between the two governments.

"There is widespread recognition that what we said needed to be said, but we should have used regular diplomatic channels."

"There was an aura of artificiality (about the way in which

the crisis developed) because all of Canada's political leaders would rather not accept nuclear armaments," Albinski said.

The offense to the Canadian government embodied in the State Department's statement last week was all the more difficult to bear, Albinski said, because of the close defensive, economic and cultural ties which bind the two states.

"We were much more public in our rebuke of Canada than we were in rebuking De Gaulle," Albinski said.

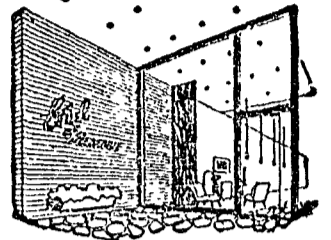
OUR ACTION will make it difficult for Canada to back down from its position and swallow its pride.

Albinski said that whether a Conservative government is returned to office or a Liberal government wins the April 8 election, there will be a re-negotiation of the agreement reached in 1959.

Albinski said Diefenbaker may bring other aspects of U.S.-Canadian relations into the campaign.

He has already said the U.S. statement was an intrusion into Canadian affairs.

Such issues as extensive U.S. investment in Canadian industry, with economic decisions being made in this country and wealth flowing from Canada, are ones with which Canadian nationalism can be aroused, Albinski said.

Alpha Omicron Pi has filled its quota leaving 16 sororities still eligible to extend open bids.

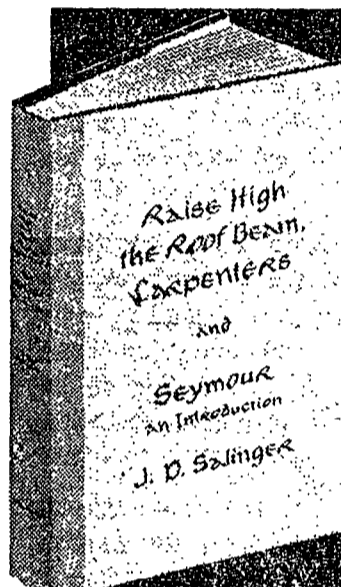

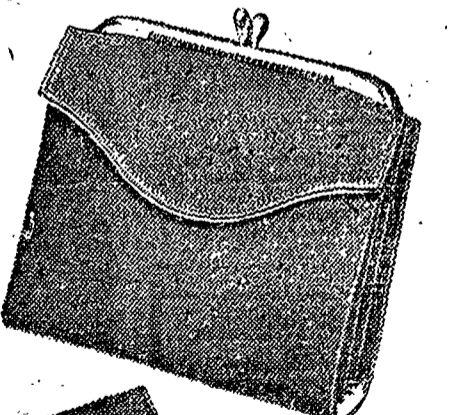

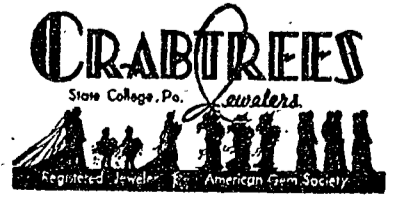
