failed in the past because the peace groups do nothing but protest, Daniel Singer, secretary-treasurer of the Council for a Liveable World, said Friday.

Seen in Negative Action

"In order to be effective," he told a group interested in Sense, Students for Peace, "lobbyists must put themselves in a position of responsibility. This is where the peace movement has fallen down in the past.

"If the protestant wins, he has nothing to offer. He must support or offer, a positive program," Singer said.

A recent example of this is the peace movement's support of a third party candidate in the 1962 Massachusetts senatorial election, he explained. The candidate lost to Democrat Edward Kennedy, the President's brother.

"The candidate never really thought he had a chance," Singer said.

Lobbyists must also have confidence that inside the government people are striving for the same things they are, he said. One way to attain this confidence is to keep well informed, Singer said. Information is readily accessible to everyone who bothers to look for it, he added.

"One way to get us out of this jam is through the Council for a from the Council for Abolishing aid. War," Singer said.


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
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
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
