izing them with medieval and Roman Cologne art treasures, the structure of the German army and its NATO role and the Bonn Parliament. Students at Strasbourg attended the Common Market meetings and visited many art galleries and museums in France.

The basic program for all three universities includes courses in sociology and political science, the language of the country and a

course of special significance at the particular university.

Opportunities for individual sightseeing are plentiful, the program director said, since travel is relatively inexpensive and there is much to see within a short distance of each of the universities.

Great language skill is not a prerequisite for enrollment in the program, although all participants should have received at least two years of training in one foreign language, De Levie said.

14th Campus To Open in Fall

Mont Alto will operate officially as the University's fourteenth Commonwealth campus in the fall term 1963, as confirmed by the Board of Trustees at their last meeting. The campus will be co-educational for the first time.

PETER W. FLETCHER, director of the School of Forestry, estimated that 120 resident students and 20 to 25 day students will be enrolled at Mont Alto in the fall term.

Plans are being made for the renovation of residence halls, library and administrative buildings.

Formerly, Mont Alto was a forestry school supported by the College of Agriculture and the School of Forestry. Since 1929, freshman students enrolled in the

School of Forestry have attended Mont Alto.

Henry H. Chisman, professor of forestry, will assume the position as director of the campus on July 1.

He said that all basic first-year programs leading to a bachelor's degree will be offered.

Three new two-year curricula of forestry technology, surveying technology and drafting and de-

sign technology will also be offered for the first time this fall.

FOREST TECHNOLOGY is designed to prepare its graduates for positions in industry as agents to organize projects planned by professional foresters.

Surveying technology and drafting and design technology prepare its graduates for work under certified engineers and architects.
