

Shafer Misses Torch Lighting

Lieutenant Governor of Pennsylvania Raymond P. Shafer arrived five minutes after the Torch lighting ceremony on Old Main lawn took place Sunday afternoon, John DePetro, Greek Week committeeman, said Sunday.

EMIL SOS, Interfraternity Council president, told the estimated 350 Greeks who assembled for the ceremony that Shafer had called about noon to say that he was then in Clearfield, approxi-

mately 45 miles from State College, and that poor weather conditions had made the roads so bad that he would be four to five hours late.

Shafer allegedly asked if the ceremony could be postponed, but was told that that would be impossible.

DePetro, who lit the torch while Sos was speaking, said later that afternoon that Shafer arrived five minutes after the Greek men and women had dispersed.

Shafer told Delta Chi fraternity, where he dined, that his message must have been garbled in transmission through the State Police. He said when he telephoned that he would only be five minutes late for the ceremony.

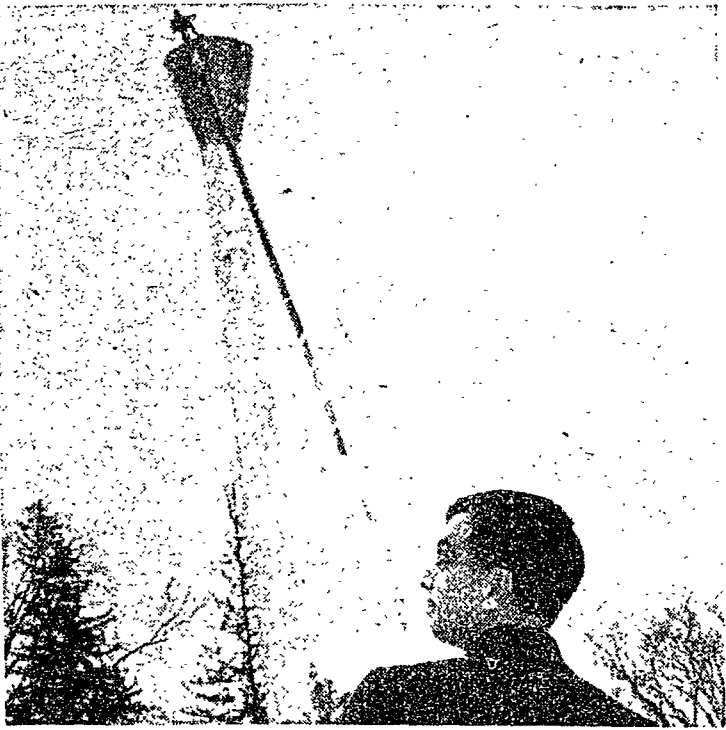
FRED GOOD, Greek Week chairman, said attendance at the

church services for fraternity men and sorority women was "amazing." He estimated that 2,000 Greeks attended the ceremonies which were held in Schwab and the Hetzel Union ballroom. He had expected about 1,200.

He added that the Roman Catholic mass in the HUB was "overflowing."

Torch Overturned

The Greek Torch, which was lit Sunday, was found toppled over on its side and the flame extinguished about 8 a.m. yesterday.

John DePetro, Greek Week committeeman, said the copper tubing through which the fuel ran was pinched tight.

"This was an attempt to destroy something on campus. It was pre-planned," he said, adding that it demonstrates the "immaturity of the Penn State student."

DePetro said another incident occurred about 1:30 yesterday morning, when he was notified that the gas valve on the torch had been shut off.

Grease Burns Waitress In Downtown 'Shoppe'

An 18-year-old State College woman was admitted to Centre County Hospital at 2:50 p.m. yesterday with first degree burns on her arms and face, Barbara J. Brown, registered nurse in the dispensary, said last night.

Shirley Steiner, a waitress at Ye Olde Hamberge Shoppe, was pouring grease from a french frier into a pan containing water when the grease flew up on the wall, dripped down on her clothing and set it afire, according to a student who witnessed the accident.

Robert Perugini (11th-elementary and kindergarten education-Scranton), said he tried unsuccessfully to aid Miss Steiner before the burning grease reached her skin. He also threw his coat over her and called an ambulance.

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
