

# Lion Wrestlers Battle Undefeated Maryland

Three new faces will be in the lineup tonight as Penn State's wrestling team, winless in two meets, battles undefeated Maryland in College Park.

The new men are Lee Wolfe (123), Bob Ziegler (157) and Matt Dunne (177), all of whom will make their collegiate debut for coach Charlie Spiedel's matmen.

Though the Lions are 0-2, the lineup shuffling didn't come as the result of any planned shakeup, but rather as the result of a series of incidents.

Wolfe, a senior from nearby Millheim who wrestled scholastically at Penns Valley High School, replaces State College's Tom Balent, dropped from the University for academic reasons.

Ziegler, a junior from Allentown, gained the nod over PIAA champ Joe Eremus to fill Dick Dewalt's vacancy. He was placed on academic probation earlier this week.

And Dunne, a junior from Garden City, N.Y., beat veteran Mike Gill of State College twice in wrestle-offs earlier this week to earn his starting position.

The three newcomers mark the only changes in the Lion lineup from the one that absorbed a 25-6 beating at Lehigh a week ago. The Nitnicians dropped their opener, 16-11, to Michigan. Maryland is 2-0, with the wins over North Carolina State (32-0) and Virginia (21-10).

The rest of Spiedel's lineup will have veterans Mark Piven, 130; Steve Erber, 137; captain George Edwards, 147; Marty Strayer, 167; and Don McKenna, heavyweight.

Strayer, the defending Eastern runner-up sports a 1-0-1 mark and as such is the only unbeaten Lion. Piven is 1-1, Erber 0-2, Edwards 1-1 and McKenna 0-2.

Coach Sully Krouse's Terps, on the other hand, will sport

a lineup that has only one beaten man in it. 167-pounder Nelson Aurdand was beaten by Virginia.

The rest of the Terp lineup will show Tom Schleicher, 123; Gary Langer, 130; John Henderson, 137; Frank Hepfer, 147; Bob Kopnisky, 157; Marshall Dauberman, 177 and Gary Wikander, Heavyweight.

Kopnisky, Dauberman and Wikander are all defending Atlantic Coast Conference champions. Kopnisky was the 157-pound champion in the Coast Guard Invitational Tournament earlier this season.

Tonight's meet marks the Lions' third straight on the road. Next week they begin a five-meet home stand by tangling with Ivy League champion Cornell.

The Big Red, boasting one of the East's strongest teams, had the misfortune of meeting both Lehigh and Navy early in the year. They are 1-1-1 to date, meeting Harvard today.

Navy, the current class of the East, is at Temple today while Pitt, depleted by ineligibilities, opens its season at home with Syracuse's defending EIWA champs.

The Panthers lost five men due to academic difficulties earlier this week. A sixth, Ken Barr, is out for the season with an injury, and a seventh, Jeff Ware, signed a pro football contract last month with the New York Jets of the American League.

Pitt coach Rex Peery said Thursday night that he didn't know what he would do for a 191-pounder and a heavyweight against Syracuse. Both spots were wiped out in the losses.

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## Frosh Grapplers Face Navy

Penn State's freshmen wrestlers made their second start of the young season tonight when they battle the Navy Plebes at Annapolis.

Coach Dave Adams' frosh squad dropped its opener, 21-12 to Lehigh, with Tom Borthwick picking up a pin, Jerry Seaman a decision and John Lotz and Dave Teller draws.

Adams will go with basically the same lineup tonight as he

used against Lehigh.

Borthwick will be at 123; John Maser, 130; Jim Purdy, 137; Dave Clark, 147; Tom Kuhn, 157; Jerry Seaman, 167; John Lotz, 177; Tom Stuart, 191; and Dave Teller, heavyweight.

The Lion frosh will make the initial home appearance next Saturday against Cornell. They close out a four-meet schedule, Feb. 8 with Stevens Trade visiting Rec Hall.

## West Favored By Touchdown In Pro Bowl

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Despite the presence of Jimmy Brown, the National Football League's Most Valuable Player, the East remained a touchdown underdog yesterday for tomorrow's 14th annual NFL Pro Bowl All-Star game.

Cleveland's Brown, the first man to rush for more than a mile in a single season, heads up an East backfield that includes Charlie Johnson of St. Louis at quarterback, Bobby Mitchell of Washington at flanker and Timmy Brown of Philadelphia at halfback.

Injuries have knocked out half of Albie Sherman's starting backfield and only increased optimism in the camp of the West which already leads in the series, 8-5.

New York's Y. A. Tittle was injured in the championship game Dec. 29 and Dallas' Buddy Dial was hurt in practice yesterday.

Chicago's George Halas, coaching in his first Pro Bowl game for the West, will start Johnny Unitas of Baltimore, quarterback; Jim Taylor of Green Bay, fullback; Tommy Mason of Minnesota, halfback; and Terry Barr of Detroit, flanker.

# State Gymnasts Oppose Redmen

The Penn State gymnastics team opens its 1964 EIGL schedule tonight at 7:30 when the Lion G-men tangle with Massachusetts at Amherst.

The meet climaxes a busy weekend for coach Gene Wettstone's proteges, who walloped West Virginia, 70-26, in their lone engagement so far. In Massachusetts' only meet, the Redmen lost to Army, 149-120.

The Lions, who arrived in Amherst about 9 last night, will travel to Springfield this afternoon to see the Army-Springfield clash. The meet will give State a chance to scout a pair of its future opponents, Springfield at Rec Hall next Saturday and the Cadets at West Point Feb. 8.

On the return trip to Amherst, the Lions will put in an appearance at the Penn State-Connecticut Valley Alumni banquet in Mill Valley. There will be short introductions of the gymnasts and Wettstone will speak briefly to the grads, who will attend the PSU-Massachusetts battle later in the evening.

The West Virginia meet gave State a chance to "warm up" for league competition and since Massachusetts isn't reputed to be particularly strong this season, Wettstone also expects to use tonight's contest to sharpen the Lions for the tougher teams on the schedule. The Lions' lineup is built around a top-flight all-around quartet, juniors Mike Jacobson and Jim Culhane and sophomores Ed Isabelle and Bill Keller. Each will compete in

three events against the Redmen.

The Lions entrants in free exercise will include Isabelle, who won the event in the WVU meet. Culhane, Pete Saponaro and Keller.

The side horse event will see Jacobson teaming with veterans Ray Cherry and Al Porter and soph Dennis Paolletti, while the four all-around performers will compete on the high bar.

F. P. Sforza and Saponaro, two of State's top long horse vaulters last year, head the Lions entrants for that event. Tom Burnett and sophomore Doug Collins also will perform

in this event.

One of the Lions' strongest events appears to be the parallel bars, where Jacobson, Isabelle, Culhane and Sforza will compete. Junior John Martin, a rising star for the Nitnicians, leads the still rings competitors, which also include Al Marshall, Bill Jenkins and Keller.

Tonight's battle marks the first time the Lions will compete under the new Federation of International Gymnastics code of points and rules of competition recently adopted by the coaches and athletic directors of the EIGL.
