Matmen Tie Maryland; Cagers Beaten by Pitt

Penn State's wrestlers ended a two-meet losing streak by tying Maryland, 12-12, Saturday night, but the Nittany Lion cagers blew an 11-point lead and lost to Pitt, 69-60.

The Lion frosh grapplers fell short of an upset when they lost to the Navy Plebes, 18-15, at Annapolis.

Decision wins by Mark Piven, George Edwards, Marty Strayer and Don McKenna accounted for all State's points in the wrestling meet as the Lions stopped Maryland's two-meet winning streak.

The tie continued State's dominance of the Terps which has been seen the Lions enjoy a 12-0-2 series edge in 14 meetings.

Edwards used a last-period reversal to upset Maryland ace, Bob Kopnisky, 3-1, in a 147-pound bout. Kopnisky had been competing at 157 all season but Maryland coach Sully Krouse pulled a last-minute lineup shuffle hoping to catch State unprepared.

Heavyweight McKenna assured the tie by beating Maryland footballer Olaf Drosow, 4-1, for his first victory. Piven beat Gary Langer, 6-0, at 130, and the undefeated Strayer blanked Ed Helmen, 4-0, at 167.

Before a sparse gathering of about 1,900 at the Pitt Field House, coach John Egli's quintet led for almost 30 minutes before collapsing at the hands of the aggressive Panthers.

State led by as many as 11 points in the first half.

The Lions cagers (now 4-4) met West Virginia (8-7) at Morgantown tomorrow evening, while the wrestlers (0-2-1) face powerful Cornell (2-1-1) Saturday in Rec Hall.

The Lions took five of the six first places, but coach Gene Wetstone felt the team's performance was a bit "under par" and would have to be stronger when the Lions meet a highly improved Springfield outfit this Saturday at Rec Hall.

Mike Jacobson, talented all-arounder who was elected Lion captain before the meet, took a first in the still rings. The Nittanies swept the top three places in free exercise and side horse events, as Ed Isabelle, Saporaro and Bill Keller led the field in the former while Al Porter and Ray Cherry finished ahead of Jacobson in the latter.
