## Dickens 'Lives' in Readings

By deleting and "telescoping" characterizations and stories, Emlyn Williams has been able to bring Charles Dickens' works to life in his readings—he demonstrated his talent admirably in performances for the Artists Series in Schwab Friday and Saturday. In order to make the characters clear to the audience—most of whom "were too young when they read Dickens to appreciate his satire"—he had to condense the descriptions and plot line, Williams said, and he did it with no additions of his own. This careful editing, combined with Williams' great acting skill, brought the characters and the atmosphere of mid-19th century England to light in a two and one-half hour program with everything from a spine-chilling

suspense story, through sharp-edged satires on high society, to a bedtime story which would keep a child awake through sheer fright.

Speaking Silver Especially effective was the portrayal of the Podsnap family, whose home was tastefully furnished with silver plate which seemed to say "I am so many ounces of precious metal, WOULD'N'T you like to melt me down!"

The mood changed as Williams enacted the story of pathetic Paul Dombey, a sickly, sensitive child whose imagination was stifled by his father's unfeeling aversion.

"Mr. Bob Sawyer Gives a Bachelor Party" showed a group of swaggering, slovenly medical students, visited by Mr. Pickwick, who was routed out by the nasty landlady and her assistant, the timid but plucky Betsy. In all the selections Williams' transitions from narrative to dialogue were handled smoothly and without confusion. A sprinkling of various British accents added to the satire and authenticity of the stories. In sum, the combination of

Williams' and Dickens' talents seemed unbeatable in revitalizing literature which has grown old but not outdated.

According to the words of some members of the audience, more Dickens will be read and copies of his works given as Christmas presents this year, as a result of Williams' performance here.

### Chess Team Wins

The varsity chess team won the Eastern Intercollegiate Chess Championship last weekend at Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y.

The team scoring results were: Penn State, 17; Cornell, 10; Bloomsburg State College, 10; American International College, 8; and Fairleigh Dickinson University, 6 1/2.

Two members of the University's team, Robert Szendroi and Jerry Bergman, tied for first place in the contest. Stenard Morford took third place; William Binney finished fourth, and Russell Haag tenth.
