Key Games Dot Weekend Slate In College Football

By The Associated Press North Carolina State gets a chance to wrap up the Atlantic Coast Conference football championship tonight in the most important preliminary to the weekend of The Game, The Big Game, and What a Game.

N.C. State unquestionably is the surprise team of the conference, win or lose. Coach Earle Edwards' Wolfpack tied for the ACC title last year but was given little hope of repeating. But all N.C. State needs now is a victory over Wake Forest today to make it six victories in seven conference games.

Duke, 3-1 in the ACC standings and a lopsided winner over N.C. State, could take the title, if State loses, by beating North Carolina tomorrow.

As for tomorrow, Yale and Harvard men traditionally speak of The Game when their teams meet. On the Pacific Coast, the California-Stanford game long has been known as The Big Game. They'll be played at Cambridge, Mass., and Oakland, Calif., respectively, with nothing much at stake.

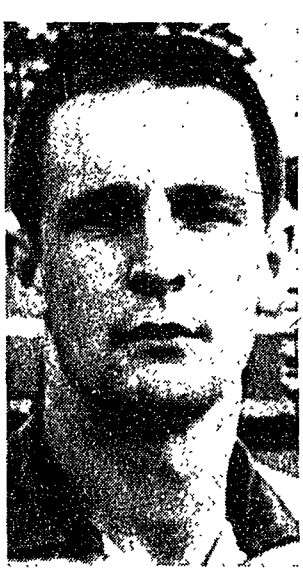
The "What a Game" tag could be applied to either the meeting of undefeated Notre Dame and pass-happy Iowa at South Bend, Ind., or the Michigan-Ohio State clash for the Big Ten title and the Rose Bowl bid at Columbus, Ohio.

Notre Dame, the No. 1 team in the national rankings, has compiled in defense against rushing but its pass defense hasn't been quite so impressive—and Iowa's best weapon this year has been Gary Snook's passing. However, the Irish quarterback, John Huarte, isn't far behind Snook in total yardage.

Lion Booters Need Victory At Pitt for Winning Slate

By ALEX WARD Although it has been able to win two straight games only once this season, Penn State's soccer team hopes to duplicate the feat this afternoon at Pittsburgh. If they can do it, the Lions will have beaten the Panthers for the third consecutive year will come away with a winning season in the process.

The Lions, now 4-4, won their first two games against West Chester and Colgate but haven't had back-to-back victories since then.

Coach Ken Hosterman put his booters through a light workout in the rain at Beaver Field yesterday before leaving for Pittsburgh. The Lion member explained that this team hasn't played in bad weather all year and he wanted to get them accustomed to it in case the rain persists.

The Panthers (4-4-1) also need a win today for a successful record. Pitt lost in its last outing against Bucknell. State hopelessly outclassed Bucknell when the two met and came away with a 8-0 win. "You can't really com-

pare those scores, though," said Hosterman, who witnessed the Bison-Panther clash, "because Pitt was a bit overconfident. Bucknell had won only a single game up to that time and Pitt probably thought it was in for an easy afternoon. They were just upset by a fired-up club."

The Lion soccer men realize that records mean little in this game. The schools are traditional rivals and the competition, no matter what the sport, is bound to be fierce.

Two years ago, a State team with only two victories to its credit upset a highly-touted Panther squad, 2-1. The Lions did it again last year, winning 4-2. Before this however, the Panthers had won three straight, so it's easy to understand why there are no real favorites.

Hosterman has been pleased with the way this team has performed since the Tempco game, which it lost, 3-0. Inside left Joe Correia, who accounted for four goals in the Gettysburg contest and half-back Tom Flanagan have looked especially sharp in the last few weeks. "I can really say the whole team has run hard in practice this week," he said, "I'm sure they're ready."

No changes are expected in the starting lineup. The front line will consist of Andy Collins at outside left, Correia at inside left, John Katona at center forward, Nizar Al-Talib at inside right and Sam Bailey at outside right. The halfbacks will be Flanagan, Stan Wardle and captain Ray Dacey. John Mastil and Bob Topham will start at full-back and the goal will be Mike Kirschner.
