**University Gets  
Research Funds**

Two grants totaling \$91,000 in support of 17 fellowships have been received by the University from the National Science Foundation. The grants are administered by E. B. Van Ormer, assistant dean of the Graduate School.

Among other grants announced by the University today were two from the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, one in the amount of \$30,000 for a study of the basic aspects of the action of radiation on microorganisms by Ernest Pollard, professor and head of the department of biophysics; and the other for \$8,404 for a study of gases in solids by Della M. Roy, senior research associate in geochemistry in the Materials Research Laboratory.

The Air Force Office of Scientific Research has approved \$8,263 for a study of mathematical foundations of turbulence theory conducted by John L. Lumley, professor of aeronautical engineering.

With a \$28,551 grant from the Public Health Service, I. C. Hisatsune, professor of chemistry, will study structures of some oxides of nitrogen, while an \$8,933 grant from the U.S. Office of Education will support Jack N. Sparks, associate professor of educational psychology, in a study of effects of inapplicability of the continuity condition upon the probability distribution of selected statistics and their implications for research in education.

In support of institutional engineering services, the General State Authority has authorized \$5,000 for a study by Frederick R. Axelson, associate professor of engineering research in the Institute for Building Research.

**Education Aid Proposed**

A University professor Thursday proposed new roles for both the church and the state in education.

Luther H. Harshbarger, head of the department of religious studies, told a religious convention audience the federal government should subsidize church-related schools and colleges.

Harshbarger addressed a meeting of the Commission on Religion in Appalachia at Knoxville, Tenn.

"The proper role of both the church and the state is to be concerned with education, welfare work, hospitals and social conditions," he told the group.

Harshbarger went on: "The wall of separation put between government and religion is not part of the constitution process, although it is commonly assumed to be."

The commission is composed of churchmen from 17 different denominations. Its purpose is to make studies on how best to administer to Appalachia's religious needs.

Harshbarger went from Tennessee to New York Thursday and was not available for elaboration on his remarks.

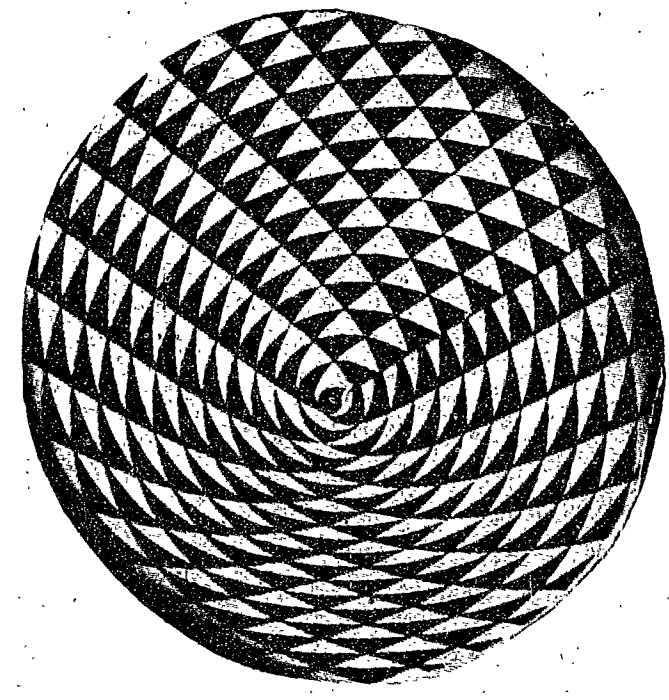
