

# Graduate Students Receive Aid For Psychological Clinical Work

Sixteen University graduate students have been selected for U.S. Public Health Training Fellowships in clinical psychology.

They will work in the University's Psychological Clinic, according to its director, Richard M. Lundy, professor of psychology.

Both their efforts and that of the Clinic are this year supported by an \$87,947 grant from the U.S. Public Health Service.

The facilities of the Clinic are open to residents of the

University Park area as well as to University students and staff. Last year saw some 200 new admissions, with about a third of them drawn from the student population.

"The reasons which most often impel people to seek help," Lundy says, "are feelings of inadequacy, difficulties in family relationships, and problems which stem from getting along with others in daily life or on the job. We have available a professional staff of nine members in addition to the trainees to offer personal-

ity assessments and individual therapy to applicants."

Child evaluations are another important aspect of the Clinic's activities. Parents whose children display learning problems, developmental or behavioral problems related to brain damage can arrange for consultations.

"The Clinic has been very successful in approaching children through play therapy," according to Lundy. "In the relaxed atmosphere of the playroom, a child can overcome his fears and learn to explore and resolve them."

"In the past few years, we have gradually expanded our entire program," he continues.

Patients may apply directly to the Clinic for help, or they may be referred to physicians, school personnel, ministers, or University officials.

# Kappa Kappa Gamma Wins Derby Day Prize

Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority reigned as overall Derby Day winner Sunday afternoon on the HUB lawn in the closest contest in Derby Day history at Penn State.

Just eight points separated the first and fourth place sororities. Kappa completed a total of 72 points, edging second place Kappa Delta sorority with 70 and Zeta Tau Alpha with 67. Delta Delta Delta was fourth with 64 points.

Ellen Sandercock (4th-Home Economics Ed.-Easton) of Kappa Delta was selected "Miss Derby Darling" from 21 contestants, each representing a sorority participating in Derby Day, sponsored by Sigma Chi fraternity. Runners-up in the "Darling" contest were Janet Heinel of Kappa Kappa Gamma, second; Karen Abels of Delta Delta Delta, third; and Linda Barter of Alpha Sigma Alpha, fourth. The two remaining finalists were Aline Taylor of Alpha Chi Omega and Irene Chervinsky of Phi Sigma Sig-

ma.

Kappa got off to an early start by finding the hidden "golden derby" the first day of Derby Week. Zeta Tau Alpha topped honors in the "Derby Snatch" carrying off 34 derbies prior to the games Sunday. Kappa Kappa Gamma was second with 32 derbies, Kappa Delta third with 30 and Alpha Phi snatched 28. The Zetas were awarded the "spirit award" at the close of Sunday's contests.

The Limbo Contest was won by Gamma Phi Beta, with Alpha Omicron Pi second, and Alpha Delta Pi third. The "Bag-a-Sigma" was won by ZTA; Iota Alpha Pi was second and Alpha Omicron Pi and Delta Zeta tied for third.

The "Smoke-a-Cig" contest, featuring female cigar smoking experts was copied by Gamma Phi Beta. Theta Phi Alpha was second and Alpha Kappa Alpha third.

The Kappas ran a crooked mile to capture first place in the "Bat-Spin Relay". They were trailed closely by the KDs. Alpha Xi Delta ran third. Alpha Sigma Alpha crawled

and ran the fastest to win the Wheelbarrow Derby. Second was Iota Alpha Pi and third, Alpha Omicron Pi.

Tri-Delt next pushed forward winning two and placing second in three of the last four events. The pie-eating contest was won by Delta Delta Delta. Second was Alpha Epsilon Phi and third was Zeta Tau Alpha.

The spoon relay was won by Delta Delta Delta with Alpha Gamma Delta and Gamma Phi Beta tied for second. Phi Sigma Sigma was third.

In the Mystery Event, a turtle race in which the turtles could be prodded and moved only with straws and without hands, a Chi Omega participant steered her turtle from the post to victory on the HUB lawn. Delta Delta Delta was second and Alpha Epsilon Phi third.

The Kappa Delta version of Mary Poppins carried first place honors in the "Dress-a-Sig" contest. Delta Delta Delta was second and Alpha Chi Omega third.

## NSA Plans Draft Study

WASHINGTON — The National Student Association announced yesterday it will submit findings on student attitudes toward the draft to the President's National Advisory Committee on the Selective Service.

The NSA, which opposes the draft system, said the findings will be obtained in referendums on 30 to 40 campuses late next month. The referendums will

be sponsored by student government organizations on the various campuses.

NSA President W. Eugene Groves said the students will be asked if they feel the colleges should cooperate in the granting of student deferments by releasing grades and if they think the draft should be abolished. The students will also be asked their objections to the present system.
